MY FRIEND EVA

A memory by Jill Ponter

I can remember as a very small child taking a message to my friend, Margaret Todd's mum, I must have been about 3 years old. My mum would write a message on a piece of paper, put it in a little purse, give it to me so that I could go down the road and deliver it. Mum would watch me go down the road and wait for one of Mrs Todd's girls to bring me back. It was usually Margaret that brought me back, but on my way down the road I would sometimes see Mrs Wally going across the road to the shops. All of us kids used to call Wally Sparey, Mr Wally as we couldn't remember Mr Sparey. Eva was for a long time Mrs Wally, she was always by Wally's side, but so busy in the garden. She wasn't good at housework as she told Margaret and I some years later, but to us children she was the best!

Wally had a sit up and beg bike, he had put a child's seat on the crossbar so children could have a ride when we saw him. Now being the kind of kid I was I would go down the road to Mrs Todd's, deliver the message, then go round to 121 Tuffley Lane; I would slap the door of the house and when Eva came to the door I would ask her if Mr Wally could come out to play. Of course if he could, perhaps I could have a bike ride. If I was lucky Eva would take me back to my home, mum always told her to send me home if I was a nuisance, but I kept going and knocking on the door to ask for Mr Wally.

Eva was always a big part of the lives of all the children who live in Lower Tuffley as well as Wally; but Wally's sudden death was a shock to the whole family. My brother, David, worked for British Rail and came home and told mum and dad, he said that he died of a heart attack.

My mum went down to Eva's that day and told her that if she needed anything at all she could always come to 14 Randwick Road; and if she needed anyone to talk to mum was a good listener.

Eva became another member of the Cohen's Café; it was always open house and as usual me and Margaret were the number one washeruppers. Eva very rarely came during the week but would come on Saturday afternoons, on the pretext that the Community Council needed someone to take notes. Our front room, for a while, was the Community Centre meeting room; that was the Centre in Tuffley Lane of which Wally and Eva were members. My mum was chief tea and coffee maker on those occasions.

As we grew up Eva became increasingly more independent and mum would often tell her to slow down. Eva said that she had lots to do and wanted to see as much of her family as she could, but mum said to her that she was always welcome at number 14.

After the death of my own father, mum and Eva became closer; they would often commiserate about life, but their friendship never waivered. They would get together and talk about their husbands, their pets and which of the two was easier to control; there was much laughter between the two of them.

As Eva got older, mum told her not to keep gallivanting about to see the family as it was getting too much for her. Mum told her that her family would understand; and they did. So that Easter and Christmas we had Eva with us, we used to go down to her house when she was having a fundraiser for the Children's Society. She would ask Margaret to bake a cake or two, in order that she had something to offer those who came along. Guess who had the rubber gloves and pinafores on, yes me and my friend Dianne Baker. We always made sure that everything was put away properly, but we had a giggle because often we didn't know where things went, so we put things where we thought they should go. Eva would ring my mum to ask if she knew where we had put such and such; mum told me to go around to Eva's and show her where the things were put. I never got away without having a long chat and a coffee.

The best of all was having Eva to Sunday Lunch two of three times each month, she was always a very welcome guest as are Pauline Deeley and Dianne Baker. Eva would tell how she got to know the Cohen clan after moving to Tuffley Lane; and she remembered the Mrs Wally bit too. Eva would talk about Wally and their life together, about her sisters and their families. Eva's niece, Dianne, was one of her favourites and they kept in touch by phone; but as Eva became more and more fragile, we worried about her constantly and at the age of 101, Eva went into Chestnut Court. We visited her often and Eva was so glad to see us. We would take a packet of biscuits or some sweets, just as a little treat. After a while Eva was spending more and more time in bed asleep.

We told Dianne that we hadn't visited for a couple of weeks as she was sleeping most of the time. In the end it was a happy release for Eva when she died.

Eva was the kindest and most loving of friends and is sorely missed by everyone. So that my friends, is just a bit of my memories of Mrs Eva Sparey; Eva will, forever, be in my thoughts and prayers, so goodbye Eva and God bless.

FROM THE TWO LAST JOINT PCC MEETINGS...

At their recent meetings on 16th September and 11th December the joint Parochial Church Councils of St George's and St Margaret's discussed and agreed the following:

For St George's church

A commemorative wall plaque by the Te Deum window in memory of Dinah Freke

To replace the solar panel inverter if required, the cost being added to the Diocese's existing loan.

To update the inventory, including Smartwater marking.

To hold a new Sunday afternoon worship session for all ages once a month from January. Helen to coordinate.

For the Church Centre

To replace the windows and doors (now complete!) and to paint the outside. To improve the toilets.

To improve access by making provision for swift exit for wheelchair users

To investigate the purchasing of a defibrillator. Contact has been made with the South West Ambulance Service.

To work around existing bookings should Messy Church choose to use the main hall

for St Margaret's

To continue to pursue costings for the possible underpinning of the porch
Bishop Robert and a team of curates will be coming for a weekend in April as 'partners in mission'. Members were invited to join the planning group.

Care and Discipleship

The pastoral team are keen to hear of those who would value a visit, or from those who would like to join the team. Co-ordinator, Linda Medwell, has arranged for someone from Mind to come and talk about mental health on 6th February 2020. PCC members who have yet to attend safeguarding training were encouraged either to book onto a Diocesan course or to complete an on-line course which those without additional responsibility can choose to take.

Sub-committees

Bruce encouraged each sub-committee to identify one key priority and to choose achievable goals for the year ahead.

Finances and funding.

St George's: We thank God and all involved that regular giving has risen now covering 75% of the shortfall required to meet the outgoings. The proposed budget for 2020 was agreed.

St Margaret's: Finances look healthy, though the cost to underpin the porch is unknown. The proposed budget for 2020 was agreed.

Parish share: Members were unanimous in their support for the Treasurers to negotiate a change in this year's parish share rising to a maximum increase in line with inflation.

Benefice events: The two treasurers presented a draft template to help track income and expenditure. They proposed that all event organisers trial it, giving completed sheets and monies to the Treasurer. It was passed unanimously by both PCCs.

Both parishes are pleased to jointly contribute to a gift of £150 for Paula Rix's first year of training to be a Reader.

The Diocese is thinking differently and consulting on the way Deaneries operate.

Full draft minutes are available at the back of each church. They are subject to approval at the next meeting.

BOOKSHELF

Ash Wednesday is on 26 February so it's time to choose what you would like to read during Lent 2020. Here are details of some new books.

The Bible Reading Fellowship's Lent book for 2020 is "You Are Mine" by David Walker. David Walker explores different aspects of human belonging through the medium of scripture and story in order to help us recognise the different ways in which we are God's beloved. And as we recognise ourselves and our own lives in the narrative of God's engagement with humanity and his creation, he gently challenges us to engage for God's sake with God's world.

The Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book is "Saying Yes to Life" by Ruth Valerio. This book lifts our focus from every day (and perfectly natural) concerns to issues that are impacting millions of lives around the world. As people made in the image of God, we are entrusted to look after what God has made - to share in the joy and creativity of God in making a difference for good. Ruth Valerio imaginatively draws on the Days of Creation (Genesis 1 - 2.2) in relating themes of light, water, land, the seasons, other creatures, humankind, Sabbath rest and resurrection hope to matters of environmental, ethical and social concern.

As a collection of 66 books spanning thousands of years, the Bible can be daunting in size and scope. In "The Heart of It All", the Canterbury Press

Lent book for 2020, Samuel Wells simplifies the Bible's complexity and presents the entire sweep of its narrative in eighteen key themes. Although its contents range from history to poetry, law, narrative, letters and even apocalyptic literature, at the Bible's heart are relationships between God, creation, Jesus, the Church, the Spirit and the Kingdom. Samuel Wells argues that this provides a lens through which the whole Bible can be understood.

Life often feels like a rough journey along a challenging road, especially in our own turbulent times. "Soul Journey" by Margaret Silf invites us to risk a spiritual journey, guided by wisdom derived from scripture, to help us find the way, encourage, warn and challenge us, and keep us focused on our destiny to become the person - and the people - God is dreaming us to be. "Soul Journey" covers forty days (plus six 'reflection' days for Sundays) along the road towards the best human beings we can become, guided by characters, incidents and interactions drawn from both the Old and New Testaments.

"The Grace-filled Wilderness" by Magdalen Smith connects contemporary encounters of wilderness with the traditional themes of Lent and Jesus' journey to the cross. It concentrates on 'double-edged' subjects, which bring us life as well as potentially drain life from us when we fall into them in the wrong way. How we deal with our appetites; what gives us identity; how to live with the freedom and power we hold; ways to overcome the underlying anxiety which is wrapped around so much of contemporary life and faith - all of these are explored.

There will also be a table with many more books which are particularly suitable for reading during Lent. Some of these are designed to be read a few pages daily.

science were more of a challenge. She'd always had in mind to be a teacher - but was thwarted when she failed Maths 'O' level and decided to leave school to take a secretarial course.

Meanwhile Stuart was growing up in Plymouth where his father was a shipwright in the Dockyard. Born to older parents he grew up as an only child as his stepsister was much older and had left home. Stuart describes his childhood as "uneventful". Stuart learned to read from an early age and devoured books, getting special permission from his school for the library to lend him extra books. His first choice at four years old was Kipling's "the Jungle Book".

He attended the school just down the road, run by Roman Catholic nuns. It was a good place to learn and Stuart did well, winning a scholarship to Plymouth College at eleven. The school was very academic, keen on sport, with tough discipline and brutal corporal punishment. Good at science, Stuart gained three A levels despite doing little work, finding the teaching very formal and no fun.

Whilst there, his parents' health failed, his mother died when he was thirteen, his father becoming disabled though pernicious anaemia and was forced to give up work. As a consequence; there was little money in the household so although Stuart would have liked to have become a doctor, that was out of the question.

London beckons

Stuart's family circumstances resulted in his becoming self-reliant from an early age, taking himself off to fish, and to explore Dartmoor and the nearby coast by bike. Any plans for the future came to a sudden halt when just after leaving school he was badly injured in an accident on his motor bike, requiring him to be on crutches for many months unable to make job applications.

With his damaged knee healed, Stuart successfully applied for a role as a student pathology technician in London. Finding digs in north London he began a journey that would eventually take him to travel the world - and move to Tuffley. He loved the work, studying at night however the pay at £6 per week made life difficult and Stuart thought he could do better. And so, he could...

Glaxo Laboratories offered him a post as a laboratory scientist in Greenford at more than double the pay. He joined a team which was developing vaccines against measles, mumps and influenza. He was one of a group of five, responsible for developing the first measles vaccine sold in the UK, a huge achievement. It was a stimulating environment, with good colleagues and enabling Stuart to gain qualifications in Medical Virology and Bacteriology. Meanwhile he had found a better place to live and a caring landlady who looked after him as her own son. One day however when warming his room, she placed an oil heater too close to the bedclothes. Stuart came home to find his room on fire. He lost everything – clothes, papers including his birth certificate.

Stella had found work as a secretary in her hometown but after a year or two decided to widen her horizons by finding a post in London. Initially staying with relatives before lodging at the YWCA, where she met and made friends with girls from other countries and cultures and eventually shared a flat. Stella and Stuart met through friends and it wasn't long before Stella would be watching Stuart play hockey for his company team on Saturday afternoons. Engagement followed and thoughts turned to finding somewhere they might live...

Marriage and a move abroad

Meanwhile, back with Glaxo Stuart learned of the firm's intention to move the plant and the workforce to Speke in Cheshire. He was not inclined to join them and began the hunt for another job, applying to the Ministry of Overseas Development interested in a fixed term post in Iran. At interview he was surprised to be asked whether he was prepared to work in a war zone. All became clear when he was offered, not the post in Iran, but one in Nigeria, at that time torn by the Biafran civil war. His job was to be re-establishing veterinary vaccine production required in the country and in West Africa which had been disrupted by the war.

Stuart and Stella were therefore looking at a move to a rural unsettled country, a new job and a wedding to organise in six weeks. Not for the faint-hearted...
