Dearly loved worshipping family

I'm very sad to say that, following Church of England guidance received this week, we will pause from all public worship services until further notice, to protect the most vulnerable during the Coronavirus threat.

Worship together at home

We can still share in the life of worship at home. Please find attached our **Sunday readings** for Mothering Sunday. This also includes some thoughts from Paula who would have preached on Sunday.

Daily prayer and Bible reading at home are wonderful disciplines for Christians to grow in the exercise of our faith. The Church of England recommends that through this period we read Psalm 23, the shepherd's song that speaks of suffering and facing enemies. And that we pray every day for the healing of those with the virus, and that we all be protected from fear.

There are plenty of opportunities to share in worship through the media. For example, through this period, the BBC will broadcast daily services on the radio, and a service on TV every Sunday.

Day of Prayer

This Sunday is also to be a National Day of Prayer and Action. We're all invited to light a candle at 7pm and place it in our window; to ring someone who is vulnerable and isolated; and to buy an extra item for the foodbank.

Serving the Community

Let's consider how we can all be attentive to our neighbours and particularly those who are poor and most vulnerable, offering care and practical support. Some may value practical help with shopping or other errands. Some may be struggling to feed their children. Some may want simply to talk and would greatly value a phone call. We're working alongside local councillor Steve Morgan on a scheme for

voluntary 'street ambassadors' – more information soon.

The Foodbank and other community groups may be particularly short of volunteers at the moment: if you might be able to help, do contact them. Also please bring items for the Foodbank to the vicarage porch.

The church office will be closed from this week, but Glenda will be available on her working days via email and answer phone messages (contact details below).

Understanding the Coronavirus

Stuart Mitchell understands viruses very well: he was senior technician in a team that created the first British vaccine against the Measles. Stuart has kindly recorded a short video message to help us understand the current virus better. For those not on internet, we will show it on Sunday continuously from 10.30am until 11.30am in the Softley Lounge.

Staying safe

To stay safe, we're all asked to avoid physical contact with other people, and to keep a distance of at least two metres.

To maintain good personal hygiene, we're all being encouraged to:

- **Catch it – sneeze into a tissue.**
- **Bin it – bin the tissue.**
- **Kill it – wash your hands.**
- **Do not touch your face unless you've washed your hands.**

The Archbishops also suggest that we try praying the Lord's Prayer each time we wash our hands, every day for seven days!

Churches open for private prayer

Our churches will be open this Sunday during normal service times, St Margaret's (9.00am until 10.00am) and St George's (10.30am until 11.30am), for private prayer. We invite anyone who wishes to come and to pray for Tuffley, the nation and the world; or simply to rest quietly in our Lord's presence. Come at any point during the opening times and stay as long as you wish. There is plenty of space, so we'll be able to maintain the necessary 'social distance' from each other.

Finally

Though our services are 'on hold' for a season, our life together is certainly not! I pray that during this challenging period we'll take the opportunity to rethink how we are as 'church', and how we can serve people in the community in a new way.

And as we do, "may we be granted the power to understand, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that we may be filled with all the fullness of God." (from Ephesians, chapter 3)

Samuel 1 Samuel's dedication

²⁰ Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, 'I have asked him of the LORD.' ²¹ Her husband Elkanah and all his household went up to offer to the LORD the yearly sacrifice, and to pay his vow. ²² But Hannah did not go up, for she said to her husband, 'As soon as the child is weaned, I will bring him, that he may appear in the presence of the LORD, and remain there for ever; I will offer him as a nazirite for all time.' ²³ Elkanah said to her, 'Do what seems best to you, wait until you have weaned him; only - may the LORD establish his word.' So the woman remained and nursed her son, until she weaned him. ²⁴ When she had weaned him, she took him up with her, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour, and a skin of wine. She brought him to the house of the LORD at Shiloh; and the child was young. ²⁵ Then they slaughtered the bull, and they brought the child to Eli. ²⁶ And she said, 'Oh, my lord! As you live, my lord, I am the woman who was standing here in your presence, praying to the LORD. ²⁷ For this child I prayed; and the LORD has granted me the petition that I made to him. ²⁸ Therefore I have lent him to the LORD; as long as he lives, he is given to the LORD.' And she left her son there for the LORD.

Lord we continue to dedicate ourselves to You. Help us stay faithful to our promises, as you are always faithful to yours. Amen

Sermon thoughts from Paula Rix

Today is Mothering Sunday and it's only right that we remember our mothers, thank them for all they have done for us and show that that we love and value them.
And yet this Mothering day probably isn't turning out quite the way you had imagined only a few weeks back. How do we honour our loved ones when it seems unsafe to physically be with them?
Of course there may be people who don't feel like celebrating. Maybe for them Mothering Sunday is a day of grief for the loss of loved ones, a day of regret for relationships that weren't quite as good as they might have been, or sadness that children never came. We must try to be sensitive to those who experience this day differently to us.

Yet once-upon-a-time, Mothering Sunday wasn't as much about mothers as about community. In particular it was about the community of faith that nurtured our own faith, - our own 'mother church'. It was a day to go and visit the church community in which we grew up.

For many of us it was our mother who first taught us our faith. Later many other people probably guided us along on our Christian journey. It's good to look back, remember them, and be thankful for their help. And we mustn't forget our church congregations who have supported us over the years.

Perhaps we might also like to think about how we, in our turn, can nurture and support others on their Christian journey?

In these days of coronavirus that might seem a difficult thing to do, just as it is might seem difficult to keep in close contact with our relatives when it's unsafe to physically visit them. But if something is important to us, - whether keeping in touch with relatives and friends, supporting our neighbours, or keeping our faith community in Tuffley alive - then we will find a way.

It will require prayer, imagination and a willingness to experiment, but if we want to, we will find new ways of being church here in Tuffley.
