I Peter I Holy Living

¹⁷ If you invoke as Father the one who judges all people impartially according to their deeds, live in reverent fear during the time of your exile.

¹⁸ You know that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold, ¹⁹ but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish.

²⁰ He was destined before the foundation of the world, but was revealed at the end of the ages for your sake.

²¹ Through him you have come to trust in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are set on God.

²² Now that you have purified your souls by your obedience to the truth so that you have genuine mutual love, love one another deeply from the heart. ²³ You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God.

Prayer: Father, you have redeemed us through the blood of your dear Son. By our love and service to others, may we show our love and thanks to you. Amen.

Psalm 116 Thanksgiving for recovery

If there are two people sharing worship at home, you may like to read alternate verses.

- ¹ I love the Lord, because he has heard my voice and my supplications.
- ² Because he inclined his ear to me, therefore I will call on him as long as I live.
- ³ The snares of death encompassed me; the pains of hell took hold of me; I suffered distress and anguish.
- ⁴ Then I called on the name of the Lord: "O Lord, I pray, save my life!"
- ⁵ Gracious is the Lord, and righteous; our God is merciful.
- ⁶ The Lord protects the simple; when I was brought low, he saved me.
- ⁷ Return, O my soul, to your rest, for the Lord has dealt bountifully with you.

*As we walk through the valley of the shadow of death,
Help us to call upon your name,
and to raise the cup of salvation,
proclaiming your death, O Lord,
until you come in glory. Amen*

Gospel

Luke 24 The Walk to Emmaus

¹³ Later on the Sunday when the women had found the tomb empty, two of Jesus' disciples were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and talking with each other about all these things that had happened.

¹⁵ While they were discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, ¹⁶ but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷ And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other as you walk along?"

They stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸ Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" ¹⁹ He asked them, "What things?"

They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. ²¹ But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place.

²² Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, ²³ and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. ²⁴ Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him.”

²⁵ Then Jesus said to them, “Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! ²⁶ Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?” ²⁷ Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

²⁸ As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. ²⁹ But they urged him strongly, saying, “Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.” So he went in to stay with them.

³⁰ When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. ³¹ Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight.

³² They said to each other, “Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?”

³³ That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. ³⁴ They were saying, “The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!” ³⁵ Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Prayer: Walk with us and stay with us, Lord Jesus. Open our eyes, that we may recognise you, even in our disappointments and our fears. Amen

Short Sermon from Jonathan

When all is said and done, what do you **really** want? Health? Peace of mind? Wisdom? Security....? All sensible things to want: certainly more sensible than money, or a world cruise.

As a Christian, perhaps like me you crave a “closer walk with God” as the hymn-writer put it. A deeper relationship of prayer, the ability to hear God’s voice in the stillness, and in the scriptures.

But in a busy world, the prayer and stillness compete for our time amid the roller coaster ride through the ups and downs of life. Maybe the change of pace brought about by this virus crisis will give us more time for the things which really matter: I hope so.

The companions on the Emmaus road had a two hour walk ahead of them. Their mood was one of gloom and bitterly dashed hopes. In a short week they had gone from elation to despair; the Lord they loved had been condemned and suffered an unspeakable death. And now this weird story from the women that Jesus was alive, but the men hadn’t seen him. What was it all about? The companions had so much to talk over, but nothing in the way of good news.

Jesus walked with them and somehow everything began to drop into place, as he opened their minds to the scriptures they knew so well, but had never pieced together. Their hearts ‘burned within them’ (what a wonderful expression). And when they reached their journey’s end, it was the companions who urged Jesus to stay. Jesus does not enter uninvited. It is for us to want him to come inside, and we must open the door. So they welcomed him, and at last the recognition followed, as he broke and shared the bread.

Note too, how then they had to share the news immediately with the others. Putting aside whatever plans they had, they hurried back to the city, in the failing light.

Like the companions, we need to recognise God’s presence even in our apparent failures and frustrations. And like Jesus, we need to join people where they are, in their fears and disappointments, and travel with them. That’s all part of our walk with God, and it’s also part of the work of the Church.

Jonathan now sings ‘Love’s redeeming work is done’ - a vigorous and positive statement of our Easter faith.
