## Matthew 16

### Jesus Foretells His Death and Resurrection

<sup>21</sup> From that time on, Jesus began to show his disciples  
that he must go to Jerusalem and suffering many things  
at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes,  
and be killed, and on the third day be raised. <sup>22</sup> And  
Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying,  
'God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you.' <sup>23</sup>  
But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan!  
You are a stumbling-block to me; for you are setting  
your mind not on divine things but on human things.'

## The Cross and Self-Denial

<sup>24</sup> Then Jesus told his disciples, 'If any want to become  
my followers, let them deny themselves and take up  
their cross and follow me. <sup>25</sup> For those who want to  
save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life  
for my sake will find it. <sup>26</sup> For what will it profit them if  
they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what  
will they give in return for their life?

<sup>27</sup> 'For the Son of Man is to come with his angels in the  
glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for  
what has been done. <sup>28</sup> Truly I tell you, there are some  
standing here who will not taste death before they see  
the Son of Man coming in his kingdom.'



### Reflection from Archdeacon Hilary

Last week we left Peter basking in the warm glow of  
Jesus' approval. His confession of Jesus, 'You are the  
Messiah', led to Jesus bestowing upon him the greatest  
of responsibilities. 'You are the rock upon whom I will build  
my church.'

This week Peter suffers a  
terrible reversal. When he dares  
rebuke Jesus for speaking about  
the suffering he will endure,  
Jesus responds with these  
words: 'Get behind me Satan'.  
Peter is no longer the corner  
stone but a stumbling block.



Peter's known the story by heart since the cradle. The  
story of a mighty saviour who will come and free God's  
people from oppression. In Jesus, he sees the fulfilment  
of that salvation. He thinks he knows the end of the  
story. However, when Jesus starts talking about his  
own suffering and death, Peter is devastated. Jesus is  
rewriting the story and his imagination refuses to allow  
him to countenance it. Peter wants to stick to the  
script.

In turmoil, Peter misses the end of Jesus'  
sentence.....*on the third day he will be raised.* Jesus'  
resurrection rewrites the story in ways beyond our  
imagination. It's a full stop to the ways of power,  
violence and oppression. It establishes Jesus'  
embodiment of love as the road to freedom and it  
invites us to walk the costly ways of justice, compassion  
and peace. This is a new story.

Peter will need courage, imagination and faith to  
understand and live out this good news. And so will we.  
Jesus calls us to help write a new story in a world that  
feels confusing, even scary. However, we have hope  
because we know how the story ends. Peter will be  
embraced with joy and redeemed by his resurrected  
Lord. So will we, and all God's creation will see the  
revelation of his glory.

Let us declare our faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

**Christ died for our sins  
in accordance with the Scriptures;  
he was buried;  
he was raised to life on the third day  
in accordance with the Scriptures;  
afterwards he appeared to his followers,  
and to all the apostles:  
this we have received,  
and this we believe. Amen.**

### **Intercessions from Susan Scothern**

Lord Jesus, we pray for our church and all who worship here. We ask you to guide those who are in positions of leadership at this time, may they be open to your leading and ready to follow where you are calling us to go. Give wisdom to all who will be involved in the choice of a new vicar, may they hear you speaking clearly. Give each one of us grace and courage to play our own part in the building up of this church. And we pray for ourselves, as we go forward into a new week. We ask you will be with us in all the challenges we face, guiding us as we make decisions, encouraging us as we reach out to others, and calling us to walk beside you day by day. Amen
