HAPPY EASTER

With the promise of warmer weather in the air and the gradual lifting of lockdown restrictions, this Easter feels like it is heralding in dramatic change.

Stories of how Christian generosity and initiative is making a difference in the world are everywhere. Over 1,200 Easter meals were sponsored and delivered to people across the Diocese through our Comfort and Joy Easter project. Delicious shepherd's pies or gardener's pies cooked by The Long Table, with a freshly baked hot cross bun were delivered to doorsteps across the area, as a way of showing our neighbours that they are cared for and loved.

Huge amounts of money are being donated to Christian Aid in thankfulness for vaccinations; at the time of writing, in early March, over £7,000 had been given in this Diocese, in collaboration with the local Methodist Circuit. This money will be used to support those for whom Covid restrictions have had other significant impacts.


Finally I want to thank everyone who's been 'standing in the gap' and, from all I see from afar, doing such a sterling job!

A LETTER FROM NORFOLK

Dear Friends

As many of you may recall, after leaving Tuffley, we spent a brief time in Prestbury, before moving to our current benefice in Norfolk, nearly five years ago now. Norfolk diocese is similar in some ways to Gloucester, being mainly rural with just 4 sizeable towns. It is, however, about 50% larger than Gloucester diocese, with some 650 churches, over half of which are Grade 1 listed, and some really ancient, with the maintenance proving quite a challenge to the overall church community.

I now serve as the Rector of the Benefice of St Benedict, comprising the six parishes of Ashmanhaugh, Beeston St Lawrence, Barton Turf, Horning, Irstead, and Neatishead, in the heart of the North Norfolk Broads, covering some 13 square miles, but with a total population of barely 2000. For those of you who know the Broads, we are bounded by the River Bure, the River Ant, and Barton Broad. It's an area we have known over many years of boating holidays, and having now acquired a small boat of our own, we can cruise over 17 miles without leaving the benefice, as well as venturing farther afield.

Our churches are all 'listed', with the oldest being Ashmanhaugh, a saxon round tower church, now over 1000 years old. Although they have now been archived for preservation, I found that the earliest entries in the current baptism and burial registers both pre-dated the Battle of Waterloo! We are not entirely devoid of facilities, but three of the churches still have no mains water or toilets. We do have a small church hall in the very centre of Horning village (but again no toilets) for coffee mornings and other functions, though we do recall wistfully sometimes the facilities and fellowship afforded by Coffee Pot in St George's Hall. That said, Horning does have three comfortable, attractive, and well-supported riverside pubs, though trade has obviously been very limited during the pandemic lock-downs.

Further down the River Bure from Horning village, but still in the parish, is the site of the ancient St Benet's Abbey, now only a ruin, maintained by the church and the Norfolk Archaeological Society. The original Benedictine abbey has its origins in a grant of land from King Cnut (or Canute) in 1019, which provided both land for the abbey itself, and also title to surrounding lands which then also provided an income to build and maintain the abbey. Accordingly, 2019 was a festival year where we celebrated the millennium of the abbey's founding with services, festivals, and an open-air community theatre production on the abbey site. The abbey flourished for some 500 years, but was rather less prosperous by the time Henry VIII set about appropriating the wealth and power of most of England's abbey's and monasteries. However, St Benet's was the one abbey which Henry never dissolved – probably too remote and inaccessible. Instead, because he was having other difficulties with the bishop in Norwich, Henry sacked the bishop and allowed the then Abbot of St Benet's to retain his abbey provided he also became Bishop of Norwich, and sorted out the problems there. To this day, the abbey site remains consecrated ground and the Bishop of Norwich is also Abbot of St Benet's in perpetuity. Much later, in the 20th century, a small group of men from Horning parish gathered to follow some of the Benedictine traditions of prayer, worship, and service to the community, and became the Brothers of St Benet's, with the rector of Horning (now me) as their Prior, ie the Abbot's deputy. More recently, we have expanded that group to include ladies, becoming now the Community of St Benet's. In better times, we meet several times each year to eat, worship, and pray together, and the group also organises the annual open-air service at the Abbey. By tradition, this is on the first Sunday of August each year with the Abbot and the Prior arriving by river on a Broads wherry sailing boat, and attended usually by a congregation of 300-400, of both locals and holidaymakers.

During the last year, this part of North Norfolk has been spared the worst of the COVID infections, mainly I suspect by being so sparsely populated. That said, we suspended worship in church on Mothering Sunday last year, and have been providing a weekly worship service by video on YouTube ever since. We hope now to be back in church for Easter Sunday, and thereafter we shall have short weekday communion services in each church each week, but it will

probably be May or June before we return to anything like a normal pattern of Sunday services across the benefice.

It was good to see Mike and Laura when they visited last year; there's a warm welcome for any of you who venture this far East!




