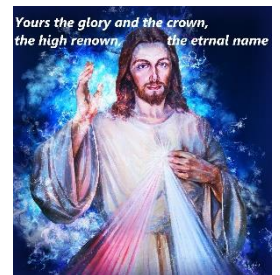
Prayer for Today

to the glory of God the Father. Amen

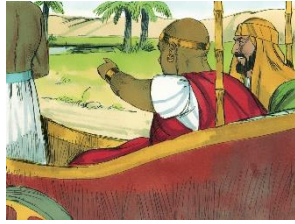
Acts 8 Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch

²⁶ Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Get up and go towards the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷ So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸ and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹ Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.' ³⁰ So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' ³¹ He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³² Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

*'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter,
and like a lamb silent before its shearer,
so he does not open his mouth.
³³ In his humiliation justice was denied him.
Who can describe his generation?
For his life is taken away from the earth.'*



³⁴ The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?' ³⁵ Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶ As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?' ³⁸ He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water; and Philip baptized him. ³⁹ When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰ But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.



Prayer: Dear Holy Spirit, give us the courage and wisdom to speak to others of the good news of Jesus. Amen.

Psalm 22 The Praise of the Messiah

25 From you comes my praise in the great congregation; **I will perform my vows in the presence of those that fear you.**

26 The poor shall eat and be satisfied; **those who seek the Lord shall praise him; their hearts shall live for ever.**

John 15 Jesus the True Vine

¹ I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. ² He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ³ You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. ⁴ Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵ I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶ Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned.

⁷ If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸ My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.



Prayer: Lord Jesus, the true Vine, train us as your branches and tend us that we may do your will. Amen.

Reflection from the Rev Canon Dr Mike Parsons

The Vine and the Branches.

It is the pruning and growing season – my front hedge, long a disaster area, has had dead wood removed and the neglected beech pruned right back. If we are the branches of Christ's vine then we expect to be pruned. To make us better, more fruitful, more productive. Do we like it? Covid has pruned back so much in our church life, in family, social and every aspect of life – and it hurts for many. But there are signs of new life growing back. Where is the new growth coming from in the church here, in your life? Has it started yet?

But how do I know that I'm not part of the dead wood, cast out into the fire and burned? How do we know that we really do 'Abide in Christ' and he in us, particularly if we are all too well aware of our failures and our weakness and half-heartedness at times?

The epistle for today (1 John 4) tells us, "By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit... God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God."

Can you say, maybe sometimes in tears, "Jesus is my Lord" – even as you know you have failed him. When you catch the - maybe so infrequent - glance of the great glory of God in Christ, can you say, "This is what I want, this is what I most desire"? Even in my failure, even with so much I valued seeming in ashes about me, you are still all I really want. Yet I cannot seem to reach you!

Then YOU DO ABIDE IN HIM – and he in you. His blood runs in your veins.

We declare together our commitment to faith:

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made; of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation, he came down from heaven was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again, in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory, to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life who proceeds from the Father and the Son who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come.
