ST GEORGE'S 2021 APCM ELECTION RESULTS

Mike Brammer and Sylvia Evans were elected as Churchwardens. Linda Brown, Jayne Close, Derek Kingscote and Dot Martin will continue as Deputy Churchwardens.

Dawn Dolphin, Dot Martin, Roger Meadows, Linda Medwell, Stuart Mitchell, Darrell Stevens and David Westcott were elected Members of the Parochial Church Council.

Derek Kingscote will continue as St George's sole representative at the Deanery Synod; there are two other Deanery Synod Representative positions that remain vacant.

After the APCM, a special meeting of the new PCC elected David Westcott as Treasurer and Roger Meadows as Lay Chair.

No one was elected as Secretary to St George's PCC, so this position remains vacant.

St George's Standing Committee will consist of Lay Chair, Churchwardens and Treasurer. Darrell was asked to continue on the committee as St George's Centre representative, Stuart was asked to continue on the committee as the Benefice voice on Covid-19.

Hans, Jonathan and Lorraine Best are all ex officio PCC members (Lorraine being a Deanery Synod representative). Mike Smith, Pete Best and Jenny Watts were all re-elected to serve a further year as PCC members. In addition, Georgina Wood was elected as a new recruit to the PCC, and to act as PCC Secretary. We are very grateful indeed to her for volunteering to serve.

Hans and Jonathan both spoke of the strains of the last year. The restrictions and extra admin brought about by Covid were of course on top of the inevitable work of the vacancy. Hans's technical skills, coupled with Pete's methodical admin, had kept the show on the road, but it had been a very busy year indeed. Hans expressed his thanks to me for organising the list of visiting clergy, and for leading Evensong and the mid-week Eucharist.

Exciting times lay ahead, however, with the anticipated return of singing in church and of course the red-letter day of Rachel's Induction service and the start of her work here. In the meantime, the St Margaret's congregation have been amazingly loyal through difficult times. And we must not forget our visiting clergy, who have seen us through the twelve months since Bruce's last service.

SWIMMING IN THE RIGHT POOL...

Helen's ordination journey



The journey to ordination was not simple for Helen McGeoch, as she was content following Jesus and sharing her faith without taking the path to ordained ministry.

"I've been in leadership roles forever and I didn't see the need for ordination. Why do that? But now that I'm coming up to my ordination day, I have become more aware of being the people's representative for God and God's representative for the community, and that's a beautiful place to be."

She was employed as the children's outreach worker at St Catharine's, Gloucester, doing preaching, children's ministry, prayer spaces, leadership roles and sharing her faith with those she met.

"I'd seen previous friends go through the process of ordination, and I thought what's the point? I don't need to be a priest to love people."

However, her priest, the Revd John Itumu had other ideas! "John just wouldn't leave me alone! Every time we met together as a leadership team; he would bring up his feeling that I was called to ordained ministry.

"In the end, just to shut him up, I said that I would commit it to God in prayer for two weeks. He promised that if God didn't make her sure of a calling within those two weeks, John would never bring it up again. I know when I commit something to God in that way and I can journal my way through it, I know I hear God in a different way."

But things didn't turn out as Helen planned.

"I took it to God in my thoughts. The first day I just said, 'Here I am' and the second day I said, 'What if you wanted me to be a priest, to do some training ... talk to me, I'll do it if you want me to...'

"It was the biggest turnaround – it didn't take two weeks, just two days. I thought 'what if I said yes?' and it was like a physical feeling of a weightlifting

off my shoulders. Then I knew I was going to say yes, and I went to see Pauline Godfrey (Head of Discipleship and Vocations).”

It took a while before Helen was completely confident with her decision. She said, “I describe it in terms of dipping my toe in the water to see if it’s too cold for me...now my big toe is in and it’s ok, so I’ll try to get in the water... Now I’m doggy paddling. I am swimming in this water, and it feels good. I can’t see the edge of the swimming pool and there’s a clear horizon in front of me. It’s been a ‘helluva ride’ but I know I’m in the right swimming pool!”

One of Helen’s favourite Bible verses is Philippians 4:6. It says, “Don’t worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need and thank him for all he has done.” She added, “The generosity of God makes me want to be the person who shines out Jesus.”

Helen has very real experience of answers to prayer. When her son was 17, he had encephalitis and was extremely poorly. “I asked lots of people to pray for us at that time and we saw some real answers to prayer. One of the ladies who was praying for us said to me “I’m pretty new at this, but I’m pretty good at it!” David’s resulting brain injury meant that for a time he was like a three-year-old in a 17-year-old’s body. Now he’s much improved and hoping to start university in 2022.”

It’s part of a pattern of God’s faithfulness which Helen has known her whole life. She said, “God has been with me since my earliest years. My first memories were singing a song called “Jesus loves me, this I know” in Sunday school. I always knew Jesus was my friend and I always wanted my own kids to have that knowledge too. I love telling children that Jesus loves them – that he loves to listen to them, even when they whisper and even when they shout.”

Helen was most recently community and families pioneer at St George’s in Tuffley and will be joining St James’ and Christ Church in Gloucester as a curate.

On recent walks in green places, I have been reminded of the words of Psalm 23, The Lord is my Shepherd

This psalm affirms God's unending presence, goodness, and mercy in places of delight and places of darkness and fear, always holding before us the promise of eternal dwelling with God.

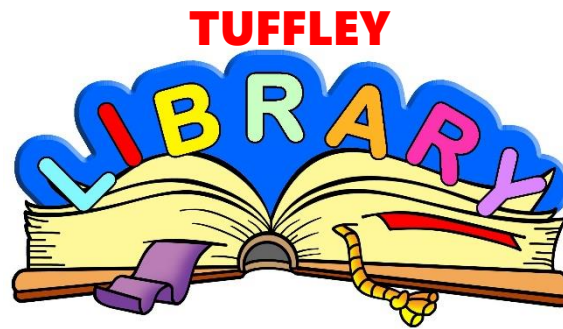
In my electronic diary the colour-coding for my rest time, holidays and retreats is green. The green of 'go' is not always about activity – it can also be the 'go' of 'letting go' and metaphorically lying down in green pastures and playing by streams; being still in prayer and transformed through scripture. Our rest and play, in right balance with our work, will restore us and lead to new discovery, not least of Self and God; and there will be space for healing and growth.

Sometimes we struggle to rest, but Psalm 23 reminds us that when we keep our eyes and hearts on God, it is God who makes us lie down. And if we refuse to do so we are in danger of a displaced arrogance implying that we are somehow above God and know best.

The staffs that Bishop Robert and I carry remind us that whilst we are still sheep of the Good Shepherd, we are also called to be shepherds of Christ's flock. So, this summer we hope that you are able to live a restorative rhythm which holds play, rest and work in good balance (noting that we all engage in work in its broadest sense).

SUMMER AT THE FEEDING HUB

Here's yet another report from our hanging feeders, or the Feeding Hub as many of the birds are now calling it. This summer we have kept the bird-food going right through, as the bird-food merchants urge one to do (surprise, surprise). The results have been most interesting, and well worth the extra trouble and outlay. What have we seen?

The birds are in their summer plumage, and in some cases looking pretty bedraggled. The blue tits are especially washed-out, with very little blue, compared to their winter finery. Many of the regular visitors are keeping away, for instance the gangs of long-tailed tits are not very often seen. No sign of the blackcaps or of the shy coal tit.

The great spotted woodpeckers have stolen the show, however. During the winter and spring, we hardly saw them, but with a family to support they have been regular visitors lately, demolishing suet slabs at a rate of knots. Several times we saw Mrs Woodpecker (no red spot on neck) passing suet to one or other of the young ones (they have a fine red cap, which disappears as they grow up). The woodpeckers, including the juveniles, are adept at seeing off other birds, with a rapid pecking movement. They are extremely agile and use the post like a ladder, up or down, then hop to the feeder, happily pecking upside down as if they were blue tits.

By contrast most (but not all) of the blackbirds are completely at sea with their technique on the hanging feeders. A little larger than the nimble woodpeckers, they hang onto the feeders with great difficulty, flapping their wings madly and no doubt using up a lot of energy in the process.

Among the more unusual visitors, there was a male bullfinch one day in late May. He didn't use the feeders but poked around the garden for a few minutes and hasn't been spotted since. A male greenfinch came by about the same time – the first I have seen for many years, and certainly not the common garden visitor they once were. This one lighted on the suet block feeder for a few moments and then flew away. Possibly it wasn't the right flavour for him. Birds are remarkably fussy – have you noticed?

Best of all was a brief visit by a jay. It landed on the bird table, looked around without much enthusiasm, and flew off a moment later. Could there be a more spectacular visitor to our Feeding Hub? Having established the principle, how can I attract him or her and family to attend more regularly? Clearly, they are too big for hanging feeders, and the bird table is now arranged so as to deter crows and wood pigeons from scooping the stuff in one sitting. I would happily make a regular donation to the UK Jays Benevolent Fund to ensure a regular sighting, but money can't buy everything, I fear.

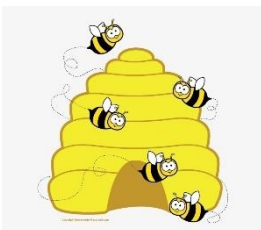

**WHY ARE BEES SO
IMPORTANT?**



Ever wondered where all the food that you eat comes from? Well, it might surprise you that a significant proportion is provided by bees one way or another. If you look at the plate of food on your dinner table, bees have played their part either pollinating the many vegetables and fruits we eat directly or pollinating the food for the animals that we then consume. And that's not all bees do for us - honey and wax are two other important products that come courtesy of bees.

But honeybees are disappearing globally at an alarming rate due to pesticides, parasites, disease and habitat loss. If these little insects that help provide so much of the food we eat were to vanish, what would we do without them?

Pollination is the vital process in flowering plant reproduction involving the transfer of pollen grains from the anther (or male part) to the stigma (or female part) of the same, or another plant of the same species. The fertilised egg cells grow into seeds which are then spread in the many fruits and vegetables that we all love to eat. This transfer of pollen can be done by the wind, birds, bats, mammals and of course insects; one of the most important of these are the honeybees that pollinate on a huge commercial scale. All sorts of fruit and vegetables are pollinated by honeybees, such as broccoli and squash, apples and almonds. Pollination is not just important for the food we eat directly, it's vital for the foraging crops, such as field beans and clover, used to feed the livestock we depend on for meat. Just as importantly, it helps to feed many other animals in the food chain and maintains the genetic diversity of the flowering plants.

So, when you hear a bee a buzzing or see one on a flower, just say thank you Mr Bee, please come back again.

Here in the UK, we have a housing shortage and globally we have a rising human population. While buildings, farmland, industry and green lawns are good for us, they are not good for bees. It's a sad reality that bees are losing the natural habitats (natural meadows and countryside) they directly helped to create.

Think on...

Did you know that we have a bug hotel in the grounds of St George's? This is another way in which St George's church is supporting wildlife in church grounds.
