OBITUARY: THE VEN. HEDLEY RINGROSE

Canon Michael Irving writes:

HEDLEY RINGROSE was a rare and very gifted man who discovered his vocation early in life. He was only 15 years old when, encouraged by his RE teacher to offer himself for ordination, he went to the Society of the Sacred Mission at Kelham for pre-theological studies and later to the Bernard Gilpin Society in Durham, before going to Salisbury Theological College in 1965. It was here that he found energy and vision for the ministry of the Kingdom, and a compelling understanding of priesthood.

He served two curacies, the first at Bishopston, in Bristol, and the second at Bracknell, in Berkshire. He was blessed with wise and inspiring training incumbents who enabled his abilities to flourish. Each were excellent role models when he himself became a training incumbent. He also fostered many vocations to the ministry. These were exciting years for Hedley and his wife, Rosemary, who was so much a part of his ministry in the coming decades. She was his greatest support, encourager, and critic throughout their 52 years together, and she undoubtedly enabled him to be the man and priest that he was.

In 1975, they came to the diocese of Gloucester, where he was to serve for 35 years: first, at St George's, Tuffley, a suburb of Gloucester, and then the market town of Cirencester. These were two very different communities. In both places, however, Hedley was a builder in every sense: a builder of community, of worshipping communities, and also of the physical community of church plant.

In Tuffley, he reordered the church in a striking and imposing way and organised the building of two properties for extra parish clergy. He was also responsible for creating both a housing association with 12 flats for single mothers and a night shelter for the homeless.

In Cirencester, he instigated the purchase of a different property as the vicarage and created a church bookshop, church coffee shop, and church offices, all very close to the parish church in the centre of the town. A disused Unitarian chapel nearby was purchased and later transformed into a parish centre.

With Hedley's phenomenal drive and outgoing vision for taking the Church into the heart of communities, it is little wonder that he became Archdeacon of Cheltenham. He could connect with anybody, whatever their background or their upbringing. He had an infectious laugh, great smile, and warm personality. Whenever he was in a room, people felt drawn to him. His inclusivity touched many. Even at college, we knew that he would have a remarkable influence for good wherever he went, and it was so. Wherever he exercised his ministry and priesthood, be it parish or archdeaconry, it was rooted in place and people. He had unflagging good humour, wisdom, patience, and grace.

Hedley had the unique distinction of serving as archdeacon in all three of the dioceses in which he had been a parish priest, as, in retirement, Hedley covered the vacancies as the Acting Archdeacon of Malmesbury and subsequently Acting Archdeacon of Oxford. He was indeed an outstanding and godly archdeacon.

Throughout his ministry, Hedley was a school governor at both state and independent schools. His presence and wisdom were always valued. He had the great gift of being able to stand back and see situations and issues in their entirety. Indeed, he was at a Zoom meeting of school governors only three weeks before he died.

Hedley was immensely proud of his family, and they provided him with a deep stability and lasting joy. Rosemary and the children, Chris, Emma, and Louise, all shared in a ministry of welcome and hospitality, besides giving their musical expertise in worship and in the wider communities in which they lived. There are countless people, both lay and ordained, who have cause to be immeasurably grateful for the Ringroses, and especially for Hedley's part in their lives. It is with great gratitude and affection that he will always be remembered.

The Ven. Hedley Sidney Ringrose died on 15 April, aged 78.

I returned to Church following the Baptism of our two children Andrew and Richard by Hedley. I will always remember his kindness and gentleness and his caring for ourselves and all our extended family. Richard's baptism was done around harvest time and my little niece Nicola decided she liked the look of the rosy red apples laid out in front of the Altar.

Mummy was rather anxious that she might take one and pulled her back. Tears were on the way and Hedley said, "Don't worry Mum just let her wander" which she duly did, and no apple was harmed in the process.

Following the baptism, I came back to church to re-evaluate and rekindle my faith, but I needed to feel my own way slowly. I didn't take communion for practically a year, but on hearing the words; Draw near with faith; I went forward for communion. Hedley's words to me as I left the church that morning were. "Linda, I was so glad that you felt able to take communion; I knew you would get there in your own time."

That was Hedley, he seemed to know instinctively not to push but to allow people to find their own way. Hedley took me out on several occasion to tricky pastoral situations and I was able to observe him quietly at what he did best. His gentleness, kindness, empathy, and lovely sense of humour always carried him through many sticky situations.

I will be ever grateful to dear Hedley for allowing me what I needed at that point in my journey back to faith as our love and prayers go out to Rosie and family.

May he rise in glory and rest in peace.

OUR BIG DAY

We have started planning for Rachel's Institution and Induction. (Perhaps we could shorten it to the '2i' or maybe the InstiDuction?) It will be at St George's on Monday 26th July at 7.00pm.

Planning isn't proving too easy. As I write, the country is awaiting news of the long-promised relaxation of the Covid restrictions, scheduled for 21st June. That may go ahead... or it may well be delayed for perhaps two or four weeks, or even longer. But even if things are relaxed, what will be the detailed guidance for the churches, and how long will we have to wait for that to come through?

At the moment we can only plan on the existing rules, i.e. social distancing, masks, and no singing, but it is still possible that things may change in our favour on one or more of these issues.

On that basis, several points have come up so far:

- 1) We may be able to sing outside at the beginning and end of the service (depending on the weather of course!)
- 2) We aren't expecting a large contingent from Lincoln. In fact, Rachel will be supported by just five people, including of course her husband Paul. Allowing for the Bishop, Archdeacon and other guests, this means that there should be room for about thirty from our own congregations. (But that may increase if Covid rules change).
- 3) Possibly we could arrange for an overflow congregation outdoors or in the Main Hall, connected by a video link.
- 4) Refreshments will have to be minimal. We plan to provide a glass of wine or fruit juice at the end. But that will probably be that... so people will need to have something to eat before setting out.
- 5) We aim to avoid excessive length (of course!) but there will be a number of duties to be covered. These will include the readings, intercessions, presentation of symbolic gifts at the altar, and welcomes from representatives of the Tuffley church and community.

Please expect to see a good range of folk doing things, from both our churches, and from the wider community. This won't of course be a purely St George's event. I am sure we can count on our stalwarts not to be upset if they aren't asked to do the jobs they might usually expect to do.

Rachel has chosen the hymns and songs - that is her privilege for this occasion! I have had a sneaky preview and I am sure everyone will enjoy her selection. One hymn may be a little less familiar: "There's a wideness in God's mercy". I'm not sure when we last sang it! We will have to work it in once or twice before the big day, so we can get used to it.

That's about all I say as of now (mid-June) but listen out for further news as the weeks go by. One thing is for sure – this will be a red-letter day for us, and for our partners in Church in Tuffley, and I hope for the wider community.

MESSAGE FROM BISHOP RACHEL

Saying 'yes' to God

Last weekend I had the joy of being with the curates of this diocese as they gathered for a weekend of teaching, prayer and reflection; and next week I will be on retreat with those among them preparing for ordination as deacons and

priests. This will be a significant landmark in their lives, but most importantly a significant landmark in the life of the Church, because ordination is primarily about the calling of the whole Body of Christ.

When those to be ordained priest and deacon stand in the cathedral and publicly say 'yes' to God, it is rooted in the 'yes' of baptism. It is why the ordination service begins with the words:

'The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his Kingdom'.

I pray that we will all keep these words in mind as we emerge into the next season and experiment locally with new patterns of worship, so that all expressions of our gathered worship, not least across multi-parish benefices, send out the youngest to the oldest into daily life to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of God's Kingdom. If our local expressions of Church do not have this at the heart then we are in danger of doing Church but not being Church.

As I listen to the stories of those coming to be ordained, and those once more coming to confirmation to confirm the promises that were made when they were baptised, often as tiny children, I am struck by the big 'yes' having often emerged from seemingly small words and encounters which have been fanned into flame by the work of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus Christ's words as told in last Sunday's gospel reading (Mark 4:31 – 32) speak of the tiny seed growing into an enormous tree, whose branches become a place of welcome, hospitality, life, and home, for the birds of the air. Here is a picture of the Kingdom of God which begins with the small.

As the ordinands prepare to say 'yes' to serving Christ in their calling, may these coming weeks and months be a season for a fresh 'yes' to God from us all, from the youngest to the oldest. It is perhaps good to remember that this is not only the time of year for ordinations but it is also the time of year for our primary school leavers' services, taking place online at a school near you. It is a beautiful time of worship as the children look back with thanks and are sent out to the next chapter of their lives, amid so much that is uncertain and unknown. Yet children are often far better than adults at authentically living their faith in the


small things of everyday life and being Church among the people and places of their week, including home and school.

As we pray for our 15 new priests and six new deacons, and all those participating in a leavers' service in their school, let us continue to pray for one another that we would have the courage, from the tiniest to the tallest, to say 'yes' to God afresh in our commitment to follow Christ, and to be expectant about what can take root and grow in the stuff of our everyday lives as we seek to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of God's Kingdom.

WEDDING REGISTERS

The procedures for wedding certificates and registers changed with effect from May 2021. To comply, all the wedding registers of our two churches have been handed over to the Registrar and the Gloucester Archivist at the Gloucestershire Heritage Hub just off Alvin Street, Gloucester. The end result of this is that we no longer have any information regarding weddings that have taken place in either of our two churches, so are no longer able to provide copies of wedding certificates.

If anyone in your family or friends asks about a copy wedding certificates, they will need to contact the Registrar at Gloucestershire Heritage Hub and pay them a fee. The registrar will be the only person to contact regarding copies of wedding certificates for all future weddings too.


