That probably resonates for most of us, as in many ways the last two years have been collectively difficult and unpredictable. Linda Medwell writes...

A few months ago, I unfortunately had the occasion to use the emergency services. I spent 16 hours in Casualty and finally was admitted to the Assessment Unit to be treated. At this point I would like to emphasise this is in no way a gripe about our wonderful NHS. What I witnessed I found really distressing. I arrived to see 15 ambulances piled up outside Casualty with many sick patients waiting to get access to the unit due to the lack of beds. Later, on speaking to a delightful Staff Nurse, I was told that in the space of a couple of hours they had seen 101 patients and still they kept coming.

During the night I witnessed people begging for help for their loved ones with mental health issues, an older lady who slept in her invalid chair for 26 hours awaiting a vacant bed and being looked after by a very distressed loving daughter, and the usual Friday night problems associated with alcohol. I could go on.

During this time what I witnessed was staff who never deviated from responding with the greatest care and compassion for all who passed through their doors that night. Once I was processed, I too received the most excellent of care with courtesy, compassion and dignity. I know that I am probably preaching to the converted, but we must re-evaluate how we use our emergency services. We cannot expect our NHS to support this kind of workload indefinitely, especially in the light of this pandemic.

I would ask for your prayers and ongoing support for all our NHS especially as they continue to face yet another surge in the cases of Covid.

And a prayer for our NHS...

Gracious God, like never before, we thank you for our NHS and those enlightened politicians who set it up after the war. May we never take it for granted, may we never begrudge the taxes we pay and may we always be thankful. Bless our nurses and doctors, chaplains, those who work in our laboratories, those who drive our ambulances and other vehicles. Thank you for their sacrificial love that gives a glimpse of your love and grant us all relief from this pandemic and the grace to be bear our suffering through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

"THE HOPES AND FEARS OF ALL THE YEARS ... "

On 6th February it will be exactly seventy years since our Queen acceded to the throne. Much will be said this year about her incredible era of service and about the colossal degree of change that her reign has witnessed.

I'm sure many of you will have noticed that she finished her Christmas broadcast with the familiar words from 'O little town of Bethlehem': "The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight". Although we are now a little late for Christmas, I thought that a few words about 'O little town' might be of interest.

The words were written in 1868 by Phillips Brooks, a young American priest, later to become Bishop of Massachusetts. He had visited Bethlehem three years earlier. It seems clear that this had affected him deeply: no doubt it was a much quieter and more peaceful place in those days.

Brooks wrote the carol for the Sunday School of his church in Philadelphia. 'O little town' is a very skilful piece of writing which has inspired countless Christians. Some might say it is a bit demanding for young children. But Brooks' skill was to produce words which paint an evocative picture of the sleeping Bethlehem, but which also take us to the very heart of the Incarnation. It is poetry of a high order. Brooks heightens the effect in several ways. Note how he uses an internal rhyme in lines three and seven of each verse. Thus, we have "the hopes and fears of all the years" which Her Majesty quoted, "and praises sing to God the King", "while mortals sleep, the angels keep..." and so on. This I think is appealing to a child's ear, breaking up the long lines, and making them easier to remember. To an adult the effect is not lessened with familiarity: it gives the verses a sense of onward movement.

But let's not get too stuck on the technicalities of metre and rhyme. To me the outstanding quality of these words is their ability to move us on from the vision of the silent streets of Bethlehem to the infinite scale of God's love at work in our needy world. If we seek to grasp the meaning of Christmas, it is all here. The wonder of God's gift: "the blessings of his heaven". And if we seek his forgiveness ("cast out our sin") then ours is also the prayer "O come to us, abide with us..."

It is very sad, in my view, that Brooks' fourth verse is omitted by most of the hymn books. I cannot believe that this is any reflection of its quality but must simply be an ill-judged desire to keep the hymn short. Let me quote the verse for you:

Where children pure and happy
Pray to the blessed child,
Where misery cries out to thee,
Son of the mother mild;
Where charity stands watching
And faith holds wide the door,
The dark night wakes, the glory breaks,
And Christmas comes once more.

What is Brooks doing here? Firstly, he is bringing children into the picture: perhaps he was thinking of the "pure and happy" young souls of the Sunday School class for whom he was writing. But next, human pain, charity and faith are each personified in a remarkable way. The cry of poor, the witness of Christian love, and the power of faith "holds wide the door". Wow, this is powerful imagery, but we are not yet finished: "the long night breaks, the glory wakes, and Christmas comes once more". A new chance, in other words, to accept the free gift of God's love and to use it to serve a world in need. What a tragedy that this powerful verse has been very largely lost to our congregations.

Well, if you come to the candlelit carol service at St Margaret's you will probably sing "O Little Town", and if you do, you will DEFINITELY sing this verse as long as I have any influence in the matter. Yes, it makes the service 45 seconds longer, but I hope you will agree it's worth it!

That's more than enough from me this month, dear friends, but next time I hope to write at rather less length about what Jilly loves to call the TOONS. Watch this space

NEWS FROM GLOUCESTER CITY DEANERY

As from January 2022, Jo Pestell (St Catherine's) is our new Area Dean. Rob Crofton (St Lawrence's, Barnwood) and Sarah Todd (St Barnabas) are our new Assistant Area Dean's. These appointments follow Ruth Fitter's move to Oxford to take up a Chaplaincy post and Michael Garland's delayed retirement. A new assistant lay chair is being sought with a view to shadowing and subsequently succeeding Les Reilly, the current lay chair.

An extract from Bishop Rachel's letter to members of the Gloucester City Deanery...

I am very pleased to inform you that Jo Pestell has agreed to take on the role of Area Dean from 13th January 2022. Jo will build a team with two Assistant Area Deans, and I am delighted to let you know that Rob Crofton (St Lawrence) and Sarah Todd (St Barnabas, Tuffley and St. Katharine's, Matson) have kindly agreed to be Assistant Area Deans as you continue to live and develop your collaborative ministry across the deanery. I know that you will all want to offer your support to Jo, Rob and Sarah - please do hold them in your prayers.

Furthermore, as part of this collaborative and new team approach I encourage the deanery to think and pray about identifying an Assistant Lay Chair to work alongside Les Reilly and to whom he can then pass on the baton. As I express my gratitude to Jo, echoed by Bishop Robert and Archdeacon Hilary, we once again want to underline our thanks to Ruth Fitter and Michael Garland for all they have both given as Area Dean and Assistant Area Dean. This comes with my continued thanks and prayers for the deanery, and our shared partnership in the gospel.



Our 'annual meetings' will take place on Sunday 15th May 2022. After the morning parish communion at St George's and after Evensong at St Margaret's. This is the time when we elect our Parish Church Council members, Churchwardens, and other officers for the ensuing year. Please think about whom you might like to nominate for the privilege and responsibility of sharing the leadership of our two churches in this way and to consider whether you, yourself, might be willing to step up forward. But most of all, please keep the matter in your prayers.

If you normally write a report for St George's APCM, would you please prepare it **NOW** and send it to Glenda as soon as possible. Emailed documents are preferred; but if your report must be handwritten, please let Glenda have it immediately, in order that she can process it in time for the Annual Report and Accounts pack.

Remember your report covers the period... 1st JANUARY TO 31st DECEMBER 2021 only

The deadline for the receipt of ALL reports is Sunday 3rd April 2022; your report will not appear in the reports pack if it is received after the set deadline date.

ELECTORAL ROLL: If your name does not appear on the current Electoral Rolls, you will not be eligible to vote at APCMs or be elected on to either St George's or St Margaret's PCCs.

The current Electoral Roll for St George's and St Margaret's will be displayed on the church notice boards but from when, has not yet been decided. If you wish your name to be added to the list, forms are at the back of church or can be obtained from Margaret Barber, for St George's or Jill Ponter, for St Margaret's (see contact details at the front of Crossroads).

One Diocese blog: Will Mansell shares his 'why'

Will Mansell, Pioneer Minister and Founder of the GRACE Network Social Enterprise shares his passion for creating social change through faith and action.

"As I grew into adulthood, I realised that my sense of being was motivated by a feeling of discontent between what the world could be, compared to what it currently is.

"Every manifesto that was written seemed to be a nod to the problem that quickly returned to the safe ground of compromise. Yet those who feel lost, lonely, hopeless or poor don't want compromise, they want power and agency to change.

"I began to help lead a small local church and as time went on, I would pray, go to church on a Sunday and then try to encourage people to be better citizens individually and collectively. The problem was although some people grew, the wider community kept on existing in its broken state and the world just rolled on, seemingly crushing people into despair and trouble.

"I began to be convinced that to create the conditions for change in the world, we needed to change our economy as that was the seat for so much power. If people have a job with a social purpose, it can give them meaning. A good workplace can give you community. A good employer invests in its staff to see them grow in skills, confidence, and leadership. I started to dabble in social enterprise, founding a couple myself, and rapidly ended up with a network of social enterprises based in a local warehouse.

My day job now is leading The Grace Network and co-leading a new monastic community called Wayfarers Monastery. The Grace Network aspires to create a network of place-based enterprise hubs that can spawn 100s of social enterprises over the next 50 years. Whilst Grace Network itself is not a religious organisation, we are pioneering a model of all-encompassing community building centred around monastic models of living.

My sense of purpose in life, my why, has always been to help people have the space and time to grow in emotional, physical, relational, spiritual, and intellectual capital and ultimately to be able to become leaders themselves.

In running Grace Network for 7 years, I have discerned some basic principles for this work:

- 1. Change needs to be done in community. No one can do it on their own.
- 2. Change can't be controlled from the top down. It needs to be a shared endeavour.
- 3. Change needs to include all aspects of life. It is not just a "work thing".
- 4. Change needs to happen little by little. It is not a quick fix.

"I don't know where my journey for meaning and hope will end up but working with the Diocese and 100s of people now involved in our site in Brimscombe, I am excited to share with others and meander forward to a more hopeful reality through the power of social enterprise and the ancient rhythms of monasticism. Will is working with the diocese to develop local social enterprises in our communities.
