ST GEORGE'S TUFFLEY WITH ST MARGARET'S WHADDON

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REV RACHEL WRITES...

It was wonderful to be able to mark and celebrate at both churches the 70th anniversary of the Queen's Accession to the throne on Sunday 6th February: a celebratory Eucharist at St George's and a special Evensong at St Margaret's. At both, we gave thanks for Queen Elizabeth II's long and dedicated service and her inspiring Christian witness. Looking back at her first Christmas message from 1952, we were astounded by how relevant it still is for us today.

In that first message, the Queen reminded us that we belong to one another, and encouraged us to work to understand ourselves and each other better. She urged us to work for tolerance and understanding among the nations, and for us to use the tremendous forces of science and learning for the betterment of all. If we do this with courage, generosity and humility, she said, we should surely achieve peace on earth and goodwill toward all. The Queen also asked everyone, whatever their religion, to pray for her to have God's strength and wisdom to carry out the solemn promises she would make at her Coronation service, "that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life."

What an inspiring example she is to us all, in serving God and one another. She surely embodies the type of discipleship and leadership Jesus calls us all to, where the leader will be like one who serves, and where we walk alongside one another, supporting and serving one another in generosity and humility. We only need to think of that heart-breaking photo of the Queen last year, sat alone, wearing a face mask, at Prince Philip's funeral. The photo that has become an iconic one of solidarity, generosity, humility, and service.

For Lent this year, it feels appropriate then to be looking at the life of the Queen's father, King George VI, who also showed generous leadership of service, courage and humility. We will do this through reflection and discussion of the film, The Kings' Speech. A film that speaks to all our lives, as it is about disappointments, and the power anxieties and of perseverance, encouragement and friendship. There will be two opportunities to be part of this – Wednesday afternoons from 2.00pm until 3.30pm and Thursday evenings from 7.00pm until 8.30pm, starting on 9th and 10th March, for five weeks. Everyone is welcome to come along and to participate as much or as little in the discussions as they would like.

We will, of course, also be planning special celebratory services for the Platinum Jubilee year on Sunday 5th June – watch this space!

LENT IS HERE SOON! TIME TO READ!

There are a lot of books suitable to read during Lent so you should be able to find one that suits you. Have a look at the display on the tables in St. George's. Every year The Bible Reading Fellowship publish a Lent book. The idea is to read a few pages each day from Ash Wednesday to Easter Day. Easy to do for a few minutes daily while, perhaps enjoying a cup of coffee. There are many different ones to choose from, but I've picked a couple.

Dust and Glory ranges across the whole business of living and believing, where the questions are as important as the answers and may call us to deep heart searching. The goal is always to draw us to authentic faith - a way of living and believing that is real and vulnerable, strong in knowing its limits, rooted in joy and wonder, blessed with the healing and merciful presence of God. Such faith acknowledges both the dust of our mortality and the glory that keeps breaking in with unexpected life, hope and new beginnings.

I really enjoyed At Home in Lent as it is such an original and quirky way of looking at Lent. Taking 46 different objects found around the home ranging from, for example, a toothbrush to a clock, a kettle to a chair, spiritual lessons from their use and history can be learnt. As a result, you might discover that finding God in the normal pattern of life - even in the mundane - transforms how you approach each day.

You may prefer the book The Art of Lent in which you can join Sister Wendy Beckett on a journey to discover the timeless wisdom to be found in over 40 of the world's greatest paintings, arranged in the themes of silence, contemplation, peace, joy, confidence and love.

Do you remember Ratty, Mole and Mr. Toad, those well-loved characters from The Wind in the Willows? It was a book I loved as a child, and I was delighted to find The Gospel in the Willows which has 40 meditations inspired by The Wind in the Willows. Every episode has a short excerpt from the book, a short reading from the Gospels followed by the meditation and ends with a prayer.

A book I enjoyed very much.

These are a few of the many books available and I hope you too can find enjoyment and inspiration from them.

LENT AND EASTER DATES




Lent begins on 2nd March this year. It will, of course, be preceded by the legendary Pancake Party at English Martyrs on Shrove Tuesday, 1st March!

"THE HOPES AND FEARS OF ALL THE YEARS ..."

(concluded)

Just to recap from last month ... "O little town of Bethlehem" was written in 1868, the work of an American priest, Phillips Brooks. He wrote it for his Sunday School, not long after he had visited Bethlehem for himself. The words first appeared in Britain in 1896, and by the 1920s they were being included in most of the main hymn books.



The carol was originally sung to a tune by Lewis Redner. He was the organist and Sunday School Superintendent at Brooks' church in Philadelphia. By profession an estate agent, he worked tirelessly for Holy Trinity church. Legend has it that it that the tune was written the evening before it was due to be sung in church!

Redner's tune, called 'St Louis' is still the normal tune for "O little town" in the US, but I can't imagine it is ever sung over here. The style is very Victorian, with the harmonic feel of the parlour song. If anyone would like to hear it played, just let me know, or I am sure you can find it on YouTube.

I think (but there is some confusion lurking here) that in Britain the words were originally given a tune by Walford Davies. Curiously, and this is where the confusion starts, Walford Davies wrote two entirely different tunes for "O little town".

Neither of his tunes quite hit the mark. One is called "Christmas Carol" and I'm sure that you would recognise it if I played it for you. It's an appealing tune, but a little tricky for a congregation, and tends to feature as a choir item. His other tune, called "Wengen", was printed in Hymns Ancient & Modern. But it's

a strangely unmemorable piece of work for the celebrated composer, who for example gave us such a treasure as "God be in my head".

So, what about the tune that we all know today? That tune is called "Forest Green". It's a folk melody which was sung by an old countryman to Ralph Vaughan Williams in 1903 at Ockley near Dorking, in Surrey. Around that time there was a lot of interest in collecting local folk tunes and words before it was too late. (Thank goodness this was done, or many wonderful melodies would have been lost for ever). Just a few years later, in 1906, Vaughan Williams was working as the musical editor of the new "English Hymnal" (EH). "O little town" was included, and Vaughan Williams set it to "Forest Green" – a pairing which rapidly became very popular. There was quite a trend at that time to move away from the Victorian style of rather slushy harmony and to rediscover English folk melody.

Vaughan Williams included in EH another tune which also fits "O little town". This is the Sussex folk melody which he called "Kingsfold" and which he set to "I heard the voice of Jesus say". I'm going to stick my neck out and say that I believe "Kingsfold" is a better tune than "Forest Green" and I wish that he had paired it with "O little town". Vaughan Williams regarded "Kingsfold" very highly and in 1939 wrote a stunning symphonic setting of the tune. It has become quite a popular hymn tune over the last fifty years or so, and people pick it up very readily. At St Margaret's we have quite often used it for "O little town" and no-one has yet protested! On the other hand, I wouldn't risk using it at our big candlelight service, as so many people have come to expect "Forest Green".

The two tunes have a lot in common; both are in the form AABA, so there is a lot of repetition of the main melody and both tunes are thus easily learned. But "Kingsfold" in my view is better, for two reasons. First, it's in a minor key which gives it a slightly wistful feeling, setting it apart from most Christmas tunes. Second, it has more rhythmic interest than "Forest Green", which tends to plod a little, by comparison.

Oh dear, I have over-run my target and rabbited on a bit. But "O little town" is a truly great carol and deserves a bit of attention. And in only nine months' time we'll be singing it all over again!

AN UPDATE FROM THE FLAG LOCKER



It's a good while since I have reported on flag flying at St Margaret's. Our flag flying started in 1993, when Evelyn Chaloner bought our flagpole, and Dot Martin sponsored our very first flag. Through the generosity of others, we now have about a dozen different flags which are flown according to a set programme of about thirty flag days a year.

Dave Trigg has had to retire as our flag flyer, for health reasons. He has been 'doing the flags' with total dependability since 2016, and we are very grateful indeed. His new next-door neighbour, Adam Broadbent, has very kindly taken

over. Adam moved in to Robinswood Cottage last year with his wife Lucie and their five children. He has already proved himself a first-class successor to Dave. The flags go up and down exactly as per the schedule and all I have to do is to produce the annual flag flying plan.

We have replaced two flags lately, namely The Mission to Seafarers flag and the Scottish Lion (red on yellow). Both had become disgracefully tatty. Unfortunately flags soon fray at the downwind end, and there is not a lot one can do. This incidentally is why it is so important that flags come down on schedule. If they are left to fly for days on end, and in stormy weather, they deteriorate very quickly. The new Scottish Lion is a printed flag, whereas its predecessor was woven. The cost of woven, where the design is complex, is now prohibitive. This printed replacement flew beautifully for the Queen's Accession on 6th February, and we are following with a St David's flag. So, look out for the Red Dragon over Whaddon on 1st March – St David's day.

Apart from that, March will be a quiet month for flags – just the Union Jack on the 14th to mark Commonwealth Day. April is much busier, with a continuous run of flag days from Easter Day onwards, right up to 2nd May. You will see St

George's cross, the Union flag, Tanzania, and our own St Margaret of Scotland flag. All good exercise for our trusty flag flyer!

People <u>do</u> notice the flags. We get nice comments from time to time, and wedding couples often request a flag for their big day.

Rachel lit the Pascal candle and we had to light our own candle and move towards the font. We sang our final hymn and said a prayer; it was lovely. We all congratulated Rachel for a wonderful service. Marilyn, Dianne, Julie and I took the church tree down on 24th January; it was a lot quicker taking it down than putting it up. The baubles came off quite well with out any mishaps, we took the tree to the bottom of the churchyard to be sorted out by a friend of Marilyn's. Then it was all hands to the pump to clear up all the dropped pine needles, we had a bucketful by the time we had finished. About three hours all told! The baubles were boxed up and put in the shed. On our last perusal into Wilf Brunt, he was a man of so many talents, his granddaughter gave me an envelope with more information about Wilf. He was born on 16 July 1901 and went to Whaddon School 15th October 1908 until 18th December 1913, when he was 13 years and 5 months old. According to his report he was an intelligent boy he was always the farmer from a very young age. It does make you wonder how he managed to pack so much into his life. He was a keen supporter of road safety in Whaddon and Brookthorpe; Stroud Road was lethal in place at one time.

He was Parish Council Chairman for well over 40 years. He was invited to the opening of the Golden Valley Bypass in 1966 which was followed by luncheon at the Shire Hall. He also attended a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in the early 1970's, what an interesting jolly that must have been.

Wilf died at the grand old age of 94 and is buried in St Margaret's churchyard, he was much loved by his family and friends. I aways liked to listen when he went to the Brookthorpe Gardening Club. My mum and Mr Brunt always had lots to talk about when they got together. There used to be a lady who sold cheese in Whaddon, my mum bought some for my dad. Mr Brunt told my mum not to buy her cheese from that lady again as her hygiene was not all it should be, she thanked him and said that in future she would get her cheese from the Co-op in Tuffley Lane.

Well, my friends, that's about all for this month, I've done my best for you so until next time, stay safe and well.


