REV RACHEL WRITES...

Happy Easter!

As you probably know, we are still in the Easter season, also known as Eastertide. The Easter season lasts for 50 days, concluding at Pentecost – that great celebration of the Holy Spirit being given to the disciples. The Paschal Candle (also known sometimes as the Easter Candle) at both churches was lit from the fire, Malcolm kindled at St Margaret's on Easter Eve. The candle represents the light of Christ that triumphed over darkness and death. The Paschal Candle will be by the altar until Pentecost, alight every Sunday, celebrating the joy and hope we have through the resurrection. During the service on Pentecost Sunday, 5th June, we will extinguish the candle and move it to be near the font at St George's and to be near the pulpit at St Margaret's (since there isn't really room by the font!) We will then continue to light the candle at baptisms and funerals, to symbolise the light of Christ. The baptism candles given to the newly baptised will be lit from the Paschal Candle.

Whilst we are talking about Easter, I'd like to take the opportunity to say thank you to everyone who played a part in our Holy Week and Easter Day services and activities. A special thank you to those who stood in or who went above and beyond, thinking especially of Hans, Lorraine and Pete, due to others being sadly ill – and we did miss those who were unable to be part of Holy Week and Easter Day this year, and were thinking of you very much. Good Friday was particularly special, as we spent the day with our brothers and sisters from the other churches in Tuffley and Whaddon and thank you to all who managed to come along to any or all the events that day. Here is a photo of the Walk of Witness, and you may be able to recognise who is carrying the cross at this point:



Pentecost Sunday, 5th June, this year is also the Sunday we will be celebrating the Queen's Jubilee – so the services that day will be doubly special!

As we continue through Eastertide, let us be alert to the signs of hope and new life all around us, and let us give thanks to God for the resurrection of Jesus, that gives us ultimate hope and joy. I give thanks to God for each and every one of you, and feel very blessed to be here with you.

CHURCH IN TUFFLEY

'Walk of Witness' on Good Friday and 'Welcome Packs' into Yew Tree Gardens.

In preparation for the Good Friday 'Walk of Witness', starting at Grange Baptist Church and finishing at English Martyrs, a leaflet showing the dates and times of the services throughout Holy Week of all 5 churches was prepared and placed in copies of 'Hope' magazine.

The magazines were passed to the 5 churches for them to distribute. Magazines were distributed to every home on the route the 'Walk of Witness'

passes and to addresses close to Grange Baptist Church, St George's and English Martyrs.

In addition, magazines were delivered to homes in 'Yew Tree Gardens', the new housing estate along Grange Road, and to homes in Church Lane, Whaddon. 'Yew Tree Gardens' is a new housing estate of about 250 homes, currently being developed and which are sited in St Margaret's Parish.

In recent months, with thanks for the help from Jonathan, Jenny Watts, Lorraine Best (from St Margaret's) & David Crunkhurn, Graham and Carena (from Grange Baptist) we have been delivering 'Welcome Packs' to this new estate. At the time of writing 145 properties have been built. 24 are awaiting their new occupants. 96 have received 'Welcome Packs' and we are still looking to deliver to about 20 homes.

This is work in progress with which we intend to follow up on a regular basis. 'Welcome Packs' will be delivered to each house once it is occupied. In addition, follow up visits will be made to deliver news and events from the 5 churches. As the estate expands keep a watch in Signpost; we may ask for volunteers to help.

For the first time in three years, we were able to host Explore Easter once again, and saw over 400 children through the church in one week! With huge thanks to David Crunkhurn, Community Pastor, at Grange Baptist Church, we were able to set up seven stations around St George's for the children to explore the events of Holy Week and Easter. Most of the classes from Grange Primary School came in, and the Year 3 and 4s from Harewood Junior. We were also able to offer the experience to the Brownies, Guides, Cubs and Beavers. The children were very calm inside the church, and many said they appreciated the opportunity to be quiet - especially in the Lady Chapel where there was quiet music playing, cushions and blankets to sit on, and a finger labyrinth to aid reflection.

The Last Supper stations was deliberately set up under the amazing reredos at St George's, and the children's faces lit up with joy when they realised what the 'fossils' or 'bits of rocks stuck to the wall' represented! Although one or two were concerned about the disciples with holes in their heads, and one or two thought Jesus looked like he was wearing a hoodie! It was truly inspiring and to see and hear the children engaging with the Christian Easter message and reflecting on their own life and faith – all the adults there will be able to testify to some very deep and special conversations with children. Thank you so much to those who were able to come and help during the week – you made such a difference in those children's lives and were a real answer to prayer for me and David!

CHURCH IN TUFFLEY ENVIRONMENT GROUP

Are you aware the 5 churches which form the Church in Tuffley have an environment group?

Our main activity, at present, is meeting once a month to litter pick somewhere in the benefice. Whichever church hosts 'Refresh' chooses where we litter pick.

The litter pick in February was organised by David Crunkhurn from Grange Baptist Church who has connections with schools in the benefice. Holmleigh Park High, in particular, are keen to encourage their students to get involved in Community Projects. So it was, on a very wet Saturday morning we met in the school car park and were joined by over a dozen staff and children. All 25 of us set out to clear litter from around the school perimeter, around Holmleigh Parade and Windsor Parade areas. The school staff were delighted with the

enthusiasm of the students to get involved and with the results of the mornings work.

In March Rev Sarah Todd of St Barnabas church arranged we meet at the Podsmead Big Local in Scott Avenue, to help the Podsmead litter pick team. Over twenty of us were despatched to various areas of the community. It was a great opportunity to meet and for fellowship with Les & Lisa Jevins, leaders of Podsmead Big Local, and their team and we were greatly rewarded after the litter pick as Les and Lisa provided everyone with bacon or sausages in a bun, tea and coffee. Thank you Les & Lisa for your excellent hospitality and community spirit.

Where are we next? That will be decided upon by Grange Baptist Church, who will be organising Refresh on Wednesday 18th May and the next litter pick will be on Saturday 21st May. Lorraine will be in touch with our regulars with more information nearer the time. If you wish to join us contact the church office and they will let us know.

FROM THE DIOCESE OF GLOUCESTER WEEKLY BULLETIN



Canon Andrew Braddock was formally commissioned as the Interim Dean of Gloucester on Wednesday (13 April).

As part of a service in the Lady Chapel of Gloucester Cathedral, the Reverend Canon Dr Andrew Braddock will be formally commissioned as Interim Dean of Gloucester on Wednesday 13 April 2022. In this new role, he will lead the Cathedral for the next twelve months, giving

spiritual and strategic guidance as the Cathedral moves into a crucial new period of development inspired by the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

This follows the Very Reverend Stephen Lake's move to become Bishop of Salisbury, after eleven years as Dean of Gloucester. During his time as Dean, the Cathedral underwent several transformative changes as part of Phase One of Project Pilgrim, including the installation of 150 solar panels on the Nave roof and the development of the car park into a welcoming green space for all. Stephen will be consecrated as Bishop of Salisbury on Monday 25 April at Southwark Cathedral.

Canon Andrew is a familiar face for many, having been Canon Missioner at Gloucester Cathedral for nearly a decade as well as Director of Mission and Ministry at the Diocese of Gloucester. Now, he will step into the role of Interim Dean full time, taking on all the responsibilities that would usually fall to the Dean.

Canon Andrew said: "It is a great privilege to be asked by Bishop Rachel Treweek to take on the role of Interim Dean. I have been described as the 'Continuity Canon' because I have been part of the Cathedral community for over nine years and therefore carry some of the history of how we have grown and developed as a cathedral. There has also been a lot of change within the Cathedral clergy recently, so my stepping into the role as Interim Dean will help provide continuity, stability and leadership through this period.

A key part of the role is about ensuring the Cathedral remains outward-looking, continuing to carry forward positively our relationships, partnerships and patterns of worship so that Cathedral life continues to flourish."

As Interim Dean, Canon Andrew will play a fundamental part in ensuring the next decade gets off to the best possible start as the Cathedral seeks to be a beacon of hope for the city, county and diocese.

It is an exciting time for Gloucester Cathedral. A strategic vision for the next ten years involves several major projects, including ambitious plans to complete Phase Two of Project Pilgrim, refurbish the famous organ and secure the future of the world-class Cloister. The Cathedral is also currently seeking to appoint a new Canon Chancellor and Director of Learning and Participation, another crucial role in the senior leadership team.

Canon Andrew's commissioning falls within Holy Week, during which there were a number of special services at the Cathedral.
