REV RACHEL WRITES...

Faithfully celebrating the Platinum Jubilee

We've been talking about it and planning for it collectively as a country for some time, and now it is here! At the beginning of this month, we will have four days of celebration. After the last two years, isn't it good to have something to celebrate together, to lift our spirits and inspire us? Queen Elizabeth II's seventy years of service are a cause for great thanksgiving and celebration, and certainly ought to be an inspiration to us all. The faithfulness of her service to God and to the country and the commonwealth has been steadfast and determined. We see this still in her now, at an amazing ninety-six years of age.

God promises us faithfulness and calls us to faithful service in return. At Westcott House in Cambridge, where I trained for ministry, there is an outside bell along the cloisters from the chapel. The bell is rung before each service of the day, just as the bell is rung at St George's and St Margaret's. The sound of the bell calling us to worship; at Westcott, it was three times a day, Morning Prayer followed by Holy Communion, Evening Prayer, and Compline (Night Prayer). Inscribed on the bell were the words, πιστὸς ὁ καλῶν which translate as 'the one who calls is faithful'. Words from 1 Thessalonians 5.24. I found such inspiration from these words, the promise that God is faithful, as have many over the years.

God may call us to difficult and daunting tasks. Indeed, everyday life can sometimes feel difficult and daunting. But we can always trust that we will be sustained by God, who is a faithful God. God promises to be with us, giving us strength, giving us our daily bread as we pray in the Lord's Prayer. In her 2016 book, 'The Servant Queen and the King She Serves' the Queen declares, "I have been – and remain – very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for his steadfast love. I have indeed seen his faithfulness".

On Sunday 5th June we will celebrate and give thanks for not only the Queen's faithful service but for God's promise of faithfulness to us all. Wonderfully this celebration of the Platinum Jubilee falls on the Festival of Pentecost, widely celebrated across church denominations as the coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Christian Church. What better day to celebrate the faithfulness

of God, Queen Elizabeth II's faithful response to God, and her faithful service to us all. As we celebrate and give thanks, perhaps we could also reflect on our own lives and consider our response to God's faithful and steadfast love.

Good afternoon, I wanted to say a massive thank you to the UK public for all you are doing to support people affected by the conflict in Ukraine.

Collectively, you have helped raise an incredible £300 million, including £25 million matched by the UK Government, for the DEC Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal. Your overwhelming generosity means that as well as providing urgent assistance now, we can help those affected by the conflict in the months and years to come.

Right now, DEC charities and their local partners are providing aid in Ukraine and in neighbouring countries and are adapting to people's changing needs as the situation evolves. Here is an insight into just some of the work that's happening now and being planned for the coming months.

In Ukraine:

British Red Cross is providing first aid training and psychological support sessions in shelters as well as surgical training. Their teams are also providing temporary shelter, food, water and hygiene kits.

Save the Children is providing mobile health units, trauma kits, medicines and equipment like baby incubators, nutrition support and safe drinking water. CAFOD is working with a local partner to deliver food via soup kitchens, supplying daily meals, weekly food baskets and preparing hot meals to people living in the metro and bomb shelters.

Concern Worldwide is helping people who have lost their livelihoods by giving families in Ukraine cash support in three monthly instalments and is funding local self-help and civil society groups with cash to support conflict-affected communities.

Age International, through local partner HelpAge, will provide older people who have been unable to leave the country with food supplies, hygiene and sanitation kits and cash to meet their needs.

This is just the start. Your donations are providing immediate relief where it's needed right now and as the situation continues to unfold in the months and years ahead.

A REFLECTION UPON GOD'S AMAZING POWER!

We have just passed through the greatest of our Christian Festivals - 'EASTER'. I know if we went with the size of celebrations we see, we might well think Christmas was the 'greatest' festival! But without the resurrection of Jesus on Easter Day, there would not be a Christian Church! Then we marked Ascension Day when Jesus goes back to the Father, but before He went to heaven, He told His disciples to "go to Jerusalem and wait for the gift of the Holy Spirit."

So, we come to 'Pentecost'. It used to be called Whitsunday; white Sunday; and the churches were all kept in white festival array. Today we have gone back to its old name of Pentecost (50 - meaning fifty days after Easter), but we celebrate now, not in white, but in red, the colour of fire!!

When Moses had run away from the Pharaoh in Egypt and had ended up looking after sheep in a land called Midian, God wanted him for a very special task, and He attracted Moses' attention by fire! A bush was burning in the desert, although it burned, it did not turn to ashes. It just kept on burning and Moses was curious, he went to see and as he got nearer a voice spoke to him. 'Moses, Moses, take off your sandals, you are standing on holy ground!'

Pentecost is the call of God to His faithful followers today. On the first day of Pentecost, the disciples were in Jerusalem when the Holy Spirit called to them. Those eleven disciples, and I suspect others too, like the women who had followed Jesus, were no longer afraid! At that first Pentecost they suddenly dared to stand up and preach that Jesus who had been crucified (Good Friday), was now alive, risen from the dead by God the Father. And that they were now going to tell the whole world about Him, the Anointed One, the Messiah, promised way back in the Jewish Scriptures was now God's Messiah! It is said that as they preached 'fire', like tongues of flame seemed to sit upon their heads and no matter what language the crowds present spoke, everyone understood! Large numbers of people came to be baptised that day into the Christian Faith (today Baptism is the way we all 'join' the Church!).

The God of Creation has three distinct characteristics. He is God the Father, the creator. God the Son, who came to earth as Jesus, to save us and call us 'home'. God the Holy Spirit who teaches us all we need to know. He empowers us day, by day and gives us courage to live as sons and daughters of God.

Back in 1972 a man later destined to become a Bishop, John Taylor, wrote a book entitled: 'The Go between God'. I've always found that to be a great description of God the Holy Spirit. He interprets our attempts to pray and to follow God to the Father. He interprets our words and actions to one another here in the Church in today's world!

"Lord empower us with the 'fire' of Pentecost - set us 'alight' with Love for you and one another - now and all our days. Amen"

ST GEORGE'S 2022 APCM ELECTION RESULTS

St George's APCM was attended by 22 people.

Mike Brammer and Sylvia Evans were re-elected as Churchwardens for a further year. Derek Kingscote, Dot Martin, Susan Scothern and Darrell Stevens will be our deputy churchwardens for the ensuing year. Mike and Sylvia will be ex-officio members of the St George's PCC.

Dawn Dolphin, Dot Martin, Roger Meadows, Linda Medwell, Joceline Blunt, Stuart Mitchell, Darrell Stevens and David Westcott were elected as members of St George's PCC for at least a further year. There remains one vacancy on our PCC.

Derek Kingscote will continue as St George's sole representative at the Deanery Synod and therefore ex-officio member of St George's PCC; there is one other Deanery Synod Representative position remaining vacant if anyone would like to consider taking it on.

At a meeting of the new PCC, which occurred on Tuesday 17th May the following were elected to office David Westcott as Treasurer and Roger Meadows as Lay Chair and Margaret Barber will continue to be the Electoral Roll Officer for St George's.

No one was elected as Secretary to St George's PCC; therefore, this position remains vacant.

ST MARGARET'S 2022 APCM ELECTION RESULTS

The St Margaret's APCM was attended by 15 people, following evensong.

Jonathan MacKechnie Jarvis and Hans Rackham were re-elected as churchwardens. Jill Ponter was re-appointed as electoral roll officer. The current electoral roll stands at 41, which shows a modest increase.

The following were elected as lay members of the PCC: Mike Smith, Jenny Watts, Georgina Wood, Rosemary Haill, and Pete Best. There remains one vacancy. (This is in addition to Jonathan, Hans, and Lorraine Best, who are all ex officio members).

Jill Ponter and Malcolm Martin were appointed deputy churchwardens, and Sarah Padam will continue to serve as our independent examiner.



ECO CHURCH

Eco Church is an award scheme designed to motivate and resource churches in England and Wales to care for God's earth as part of their everyday work and witness. It is a project run by A Rocha UK, in partnership with Christian Aid and Tearfund. A Rocha UK is a Christian charity working for the protection and restoration of the natural world. We are called to be good stewards of the earth in scripture and being such is a demonstration of Christian hope for God's world.

Churches can register with Eco Church for free and access a wealth of resources and support. There is also a survey of questions, divided into five sections, to help churches identify what they are already doing to care for God's earth and to give ideas for further engagement. The five sections are: worship and teaching, buildings, land, community and global engagement, and lifestyle. The awards are graded into bronze, silver and gold. Gloucester Diocese is signed up to Eco Church and churches across the diocese are being encouraged to register and engage with the survey questions.

St George's

St George's initial assessment through the survey questions is a bronze award. For most of the sections, however, St George's is already at silver, and we will be talking about this as a congregation over the coming weeks and months to consider how we might move to silver in all areas. Whilst it would be wonderful to be able to celebrate a silver award for Eco Church, the main aim is



to help us to think how we can be better stewards of God's earth and to motivate action in our everyday lives. We would love to hear what individuals are doing in this area and welcome any suggestions you may have for us as a church community.

St Margaret's

The initial assessment is a more complicated one for St Margaret's with the complexity of an ancient building and associated features. However, what a wonderful opportunity we have through the beautiful churchyard space. This area has been described as a peaceful haven, and through some simple steps it could indeed be a much-needed haven for wildlife, especially for bees and butterflies. The Revd Dr Cate Williams, the Environmental Engagement Officer for Gloucester Diocese came out to see the churchyard on 19th May to help us assess the best way forward for this, as she has been doing for many churchyards across Gloucestershire. Helpfully, leaving most of the churchyard to grow has helped to show which areas would give the most diversity and benefit for bees and butterflies.

A plan will now be drawn up, which will show which areas will be mown and which areas will be left to grow for this season, and this will then be reviewed for next year. As soon as this plan is available, we will be holding a drop-in session at St Margaret's for people to come along and find out more. Hopefully, this drop-in will be combined with the National Churches Count on Nature which includes people of all ages coming together to explore the wonder of God's creation. We hope to involve the local schools with this too. Please do let us know if you have any further ideas for the wonderful churchyard space and do watch out for more details about the drop-in – we would love to see you there.

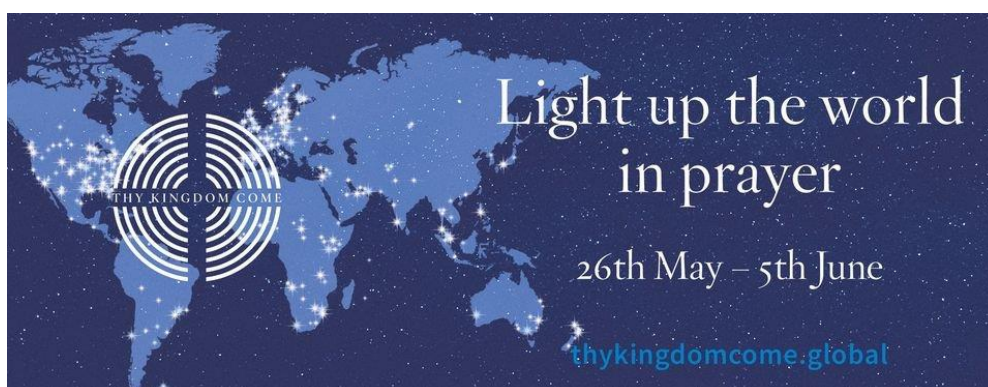
Pray for five people you know

(ANOTHER) ANNIVERSARY FOR THE WHADDON ORGAN

This year our little organ at St Margaret's celebrates a special anniversary. "Hang on", you may be thinking, "Surely we did its anniversary the other year?" Yes, you're right. In 2018 our organ had its 250th birthday. We had an autumn festival, and the climax was a stunning recital of popular music by David Briggs, who many would say is perhaps the world's finest exponent at organ improvisation.

So what is happening this time? Well, in November our Snetzler will have notched up twenty five years at St Margaret's (so the little organ will have spent a tenth of its life with us).

We aren't going to make a huge thing of it this time, though we will have another look and listen to some highlights of David's recital. Luckily Hans captured it on DVD and CD, and luckily David is very happy for us to play it again.

We are planning a St Margaret's open day on Saturday 10th September. Watch this space for further details.

Also, with the editor's permission, I hope to go back over the remarkable events which led to the organ moving a mile up the road from Brookthorpe to Whaddon. Some of these were highly sensitive at the time, but enough water has flowed under the bridge and the story can now be told...

I'm hoping you can help and will be prepared to share information about our work helping local primary school children learn to read?

Read With Me is a Gloucestershire organisation, which was set up to ensure that in the future every child will move to secondary school able to read well. Children who are unable to read properly at 7

never really catch up. These children do less well at school, have reduced employment choices and earning opportunities and a greater chance of going to prison. And research shows that adults who can read for pleasure are generally happier overall.

Every year 200,000 children will leave primary school unable to read well; 1 in 4 five years olds struggle with basic vocabulary, 96% of primary school teachers are concerned about pupil's speech and language. Children who can't read can't take advantage of their education or play a full part in society. And these statistics are from before Covid made everything even harder for schools, parents and children.

Our volunteers hear each child read twice a week for 10/15 minutes which also helps improve communication and social skills and confidence. We hear 1,500 children a week but urgently need to be able to provide this support to 5,000 children. We are hoping that members of your congregation may feel able to help. We ask that volunteers give one or two hours a week, we provide full training and support, with regular social occasions.

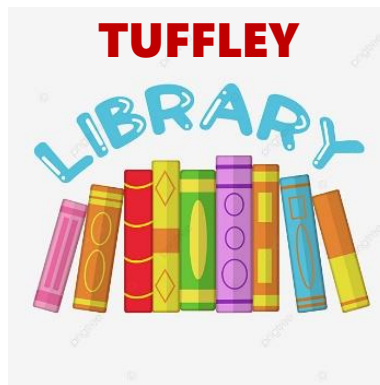

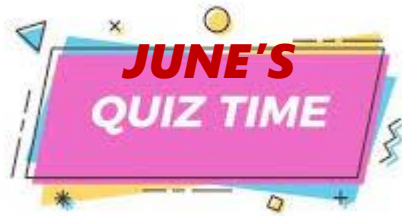
And those of you spending time in your gardens, we have a produce swap planned for the Autumn so watch this space.

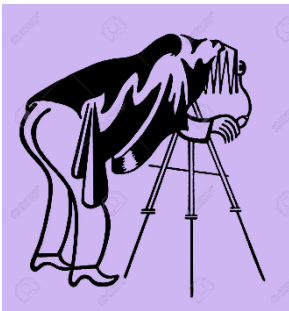
