THE VICAR WRITES...

The abundant love and hope of Jesus is always present...

Everywhere I've been recently, the same conversation seems to arise, "where has this year gone?" Perhaps at this time of year, it always feels like that, and maybe that's not surprising with all the messages in the shops and on the tv reminding us that Christmas is hurtling towards us! But there seems to be something even more intense about it this year. Maybe this is because it is the year following two very difficult pandemic dominated years, and, of course, Covid has still been with us this year too. Maybe it's because the year has been full of opportunities and challenges for us all, individually, and collectively. We are certainly living through a turbulent time; politically in our country and beyond, the rising cost-of-living, the issues surrounding the NHS and other country wide systems we'd come to rely on, the postal system, the train networks, I could go on. This year has also seen one of the biggest changes for our nation in 70 years, the death of our beloved Queen Elizabeth II.

Living through these turbulent times can make us anxious, fearful even. Indeed, looking across to the horror in Ukraine reminds us that peace in this world can be very fragile. In these times, both nationally and internationally, we are aware more than ever of our need of the grace of God and the love and hope we find through Jesus. We give thanks that we have a faithful God, who promises to be with us through the whole of our lives. Our beloved late Queen Elizabeth knew this well. In the run up to her 90th birthday in 2016 she said, "I have been – and remain – very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for his steadfast love. I have indeed seen his faithfulness."

The other words I've heard many say recently are, 'this Christmas will need to be a simpler one' - it's not just that many people can't afford lavish decorations or an abundance of food and presents. We know that many families are wondering if they will be able to heat their homes and put food on the table this Christmas. Lorraine and Pete report that Gloucester Food Bank has seen a 77% increase in demand during October (compared to Oct last year) and Dawn has seen similar increases in Christmas referrals to Gloucestershire Bundles. That is to name just two local charities who are working tirelessly to serve those in need.

What about us? Can we commit to a simpler Christmas, where the message of love and hope found through Jesus is at the centre? If we are fortunate to have more than enough, can we think seriously about how we could share what God has given us, so that others will have enough too? Perhaps this year we could cut back on the number of Christmas cards we send across our church community and instead donate to the Food Bank, to Gloucestershire Bundles, or to another charity close to our hearts. If you would like to do that, there will be some colourful stars at the back of both churches that you can write your Christmas greeting on to the church community, to hang on the tree.

However, you mark Advent and celebrate Christmas this year, I pray that you will know the abundant love and hope brought by Jesus in your lives this Christmas.

The service began with Father Gerry's warm welcome then the meeting opened with the hymn, 'How Great Thou Art' which was followed by an opening prayer. A reading from 'The Wisdom of Solomon 4:7-15' was given by Rev Sarah Todd of St Barnabas. Sarah then gave a reflection on the reading entitled 'A blameless life is ripe old age'.

We were then invited to sing 'The King of Love my shepherd is' after which George O'Neill read a poem by Winifred Mary Letts entitled 'Alive'.

There then followed a beautiful musical reflection played on the violin by Sally Boughton with two pieces, 'Ashokan Farewell' followed by 'Abide with me'. Rev Rachel Beck from St George's and St Margaret's, Whaddon, gave a reading and reflection entitled 'A place for us all', based on John 6:37-40.

The Act of Remembrance then followed.

Father Gerry invited those in the congregation who wished to light a candle to come forward whilst the Choir sang and names of 200 loved ones who had passed away were displayed on the screen. It was solemn, reflective time for us all as people quietly left their seat and moved forward to light a candle in remembrance.

Pastor David Crunkhurn, leader of Grange Baptist Church led a time of prayer culminating in the congregation being invited to sing "The Lord's Prayer". We were then invited to sing the final hymn, 'In Christ alone', before Father Gerry gave the blessing to which we all responded 'Amen', and then the dismissal, the response being, 'Thanks be to God'.

After the service those who were able stayed and enjoyed the refreshments and spent a time of fellowship in the Church Hall.

If you haven't yet been along to any of the film group discussions, please do consider coming along for a first time this Advent. Stopping for an hour and a half in this often busy than normal period to focus on what Advent and Christmas are really can be a real blessing. The sessions will be on Wednesday afternoons, from 2.00pm to 3.30pm on 30th November and, 7th, 14th, 21st Dec) and Thursday evenings from 7.00pm to 8.30pm (1st, 8th, 15th, 22nd December) in the Lady Chapel at St George's (with the heating on!) You don't have to be able to make all four as they are standalone discussions, and you won't be put on the spot to say anything – everyone is welcome to say as little or as much as they feel comfortable to! Do have a word with me if you would like to know anymore, and I very much look forward to our time together this Advent.

CAROLS AT ST MARGARET'S

Christmas is looming up, and we have been planning our special services for St Margaret's. First, we have our Advent Carol service on Sunday 4th December at 5.00pm; "From Darkness to Light". This starts in total darkness, and candles are gradually lit during the first half of the service, symbolising our journey from the darkness of sin and death to the light of Christ. So, I say openly on behalf of us all: Thank you Hilary for giving your time and talents to beautify God's house. You really do so modestly fulfil the scripture.

We recently released our latest figures showing record numbers of emergency food parcels distributed by food banks in our network between April and September. The cost of living crisis is pushing more people to food banks.

Food banks in the Trussell Trust network distributed 1.3 million emergency food parcels from 1st April to 30th September 2022. Almost half a million of these were for children.

Across the UK, this represents a 33% increase in emergency food parcels distributed compared to the same period in 2021/22 and a 52% increase from the same period in the pre-pandemic year of 2019/20. England saw a 33% increase in emergency food parcels distributed compared to the same period last year.

As we go into the winter, food banks are braced for even greater increases in need. For the first time ever, more food is being given out than is being donated. This cannot be right. We need the government to take action both now - to help people through the immediate cost of living crisis - and beyond, so that social security always provides a lifeline when people need support.

By the time you read this, Jeremy Hunt will have announced his plans for the economy, and it is so important that people on the lowest incomes are supported.

By reaching more people with these devastating statistics, we can build understanding that urgent change is needed to ensure we can all afford the essentials. Please help us by sharing on your social media or starting a conversation.

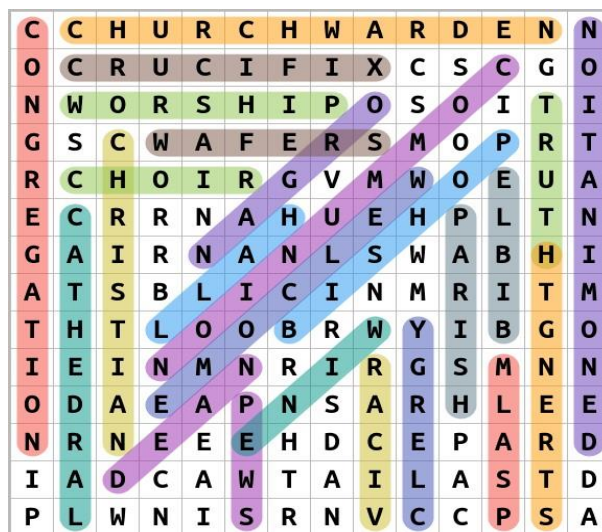
