THE READER WRITES...

Do you ever feel like Martha? Martha in Luke's story, I mean. (Luke 10, 38-42). Jesus and his disciples had arrived at her house in Bethany and were waiting for a meal. Her sister Mary was sitting at Jesus's feet listening, just wanting to be with him. Martha was doing all the work and finally could stand it no longer. "Come on, I'm doing everything! Just tell her to help me, Lord!"

And I'm sure you remember the sequel. Jesus wasn't having it. "Let her alone, let her do what she thinks is right". In all likelihood, the last thing Jesus wanted at that moment was a slap-up meal, and his hostess getting frantic. A bowl of soup and a bit of quiet would have been just fine.

Life can be busy and complicated, and church life is no exception. There are always new ideas to try, and let's be honest, not enough able-bodied people to make them happen. Nearly all my life I have been busy doing things in church, and very often having a quiet moan to myself because others aren't helping as I'd like them to.

Did you spot something there? In the last sentence I used four versions of the first person singular: 'my', 'I', 'myself', and another 'I'. Not bad going, when as a Christian, I should think of God first, the other person next, and myself last!

Perhaps the trouble with Martha was that she set the agenda without taking Mary with her. She was overworked because she wanted to entertain her way, when something simple would have been easier for everyone, and then they could all have sat peacefully with Jesus. Well, that's just my take on Luke's story of course, and we will never know what really went on in Martha's mind.

But back to my first question. I'll admit I quite often feel like Martha, but as I get older, I would much rather do as Mary did. I want to pull my weight at church, of course, but I also want a closer walk with God. I always have wanted that, and yet I never seem to get much closer to being closer, if you follow me.

Maybe we owe it to ourselves, and to others, to say 'no' a bit more often. Frenzied activity isn't as helpful as we probably think it is.

A ROYAL FUNERAL

On Monday 19th September, I imagine most of us spent a good portion of the day in front of the television. Watching our beloved late Queen Elizabeth being transported from Westminster Hall to Westminster Abbey for her funeral. A funeral that had clearly been meticulously planned and prepared, not least by the Queen herself when she was alive. The traditional form of service, the hymns, the readings, the anthems, all chosen very carefully to reflect the Queen's faith and what was important to her in life. One of her favourite hymns, the Lord's My Shepherd, also linked perfectly to her wedding, and signifying the importance of their marriage in her life. One of the readings was that familiar passage from John's Gospel, where Jesus is preparing his disciples for when he will no longer be with them physically and is assuring them that death is not the end – he goes to prepare a place for all to be. This reading is often chosen for a funeral as it celebrates that great hope we have, that through the resurrection of Jesus, we all have access to eternal life.

The funeral at the Abbey concluded, as all Christian funerals do, with the soul of Elizabeth, our late Queen, being commended to the love and mercy of God – with those beautiful words that sum up the Christian belief that after death, we will all be reunited with God. Later in the day, we saw one of the final acts in saying goodbye to our beloved Queen, the committal at Windsor Castle of her earthly body, before she was laid to rest alongside her family members.

Queen Elizabeth II was an example and a model to us all right till the end. Her funeral planned and prepared before she died, to reflect her faith in God, and to inspire us all in hope and belief. Through her funeral, we were all able to give thanks and pay tribute to her life, to remember her before God, and to comfort one another in hope. This is always the pattern of a Church of England funeral, which is available to all.

As we reflect on the example given to us by our late Queen, perhaps we should think seriously about planning our own funerals. Not in a morbid way, but in a way that we too can celebrate hope and love and leave a precious gift for our loved ones. Whether you go to church regularly or not, you are entitled to have your funeral service in your local parish church, or to have a Christian input at the Crematorium.

If you would like to talk about Church of England funerals, or would like help in planning your funeral, please do be in touch. We can't promise trumpeters or marchers, but we can promise thanksgiving, dignity and hope.

WHEN WILL OUR OLD FORMAT STAMPS BECOME INVALID?

All non-barcoded stamps will be valid for use until 31st January 2023. After this date, non-barcoded stamps will be treated as insufficient postage. If not used, they can be swapped for the new stamps using a swap-out form available online. They cannot be swapped in-store.

Are any stamps exempt?

Special stamps with pictures on and Christmas stamps will continue to be valid and do not need to be used or swapped.
