VICAR, RACHEL WRITES...

For all that has been, THANKS, for all that is to be, YES!

September is often thought of as a time for 'going back'. Back to school, back to college, back to groups and activities that had a break over the Summer, back to the hustle and bustle of children, young people and families going to and from school. Although we might use the term 'going back' we are, of course, always going forward in our lives. We might go back to familiar places and routines, with familiar people, but inevitably things change and will be different. September seems to bring with it an air of anticipation.

At such times I find the phrase, "For all that has been, Thank you. For all that is to come, Yes!" very helpful. This phrase was written by Dag Hammerskjöld (a Swedish diplomat and second Secretary General of the United Nations) in the front of his journal. After his death in an airplane crash, at age 56, his journal entries were published under the title Markings. They were his conversations with God, and that first entry expressed the faith that was to uphold and inspire him in many peace negotiations and difficult work ahead. In these simple words, he points to the essence of our common life in Christ: the offering of thanks, and the willingness to meet all that is to come in the strength of Jesus. As we read in the letter to the Colossians 3.17, 'whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.'


As we enter the month of September, let's look back with thanksgiving for all that has been over the Summer, and look forward to all that will be. MAKING THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

Early Christians frequently marked their foreheads with the sign of the cross, as a sign of remembrance and affirmation of their baptism. They also traced the

sign of the cross onto their lips and breast when the Gospel was proclaimed as a quiet prayer of 'let the Gospel be in my mind, in my words and in my heart'. Some Christians still do this today during the Eucharist when the Gospel is proclaimed.

There is evidence from the 8th Century of Christians making the large sign of the cross using the thumb and two fingers (symbolising the Trinity) on themselves – in the West going from left to right shoulder, in the East from right to left shoulder. This again was a prayer of recognition and affirmation of being a Christian, of belonging to Christ.

There have been various traditions and patterns of when people might make the sign of the cross in worship, for instance at the invocation of the Trinity 'Father, Son and Holy Spirit', before receiving Communion, at the moment of recalling Jesus' words at the last Supper of 'do this in remembrance of me', at the beginning of Morning Prayer, at the Magnificat at Evensong... And many other places. People do this as an act of symbolism, a physical prayer, of reminding oneself of belonging to Christ.

As physical beings sometimes it can be helpful to use physical movements in prayer and worship – and making the sign of the cross is one of the ways we can do this. Not everyone finds this way of praying helpful and therefore not everyone should make the sign of the cross at any point. When I was training for ministry, we were encouraged to try different ways of praying and worshipping to see which ones helped us to connect with God and to express our faith. Making the sign of the cross was one of the practices that many people tried for the first time – some continued to do this and for others it felt uncomfortable and so they didn't continue. Symbolic acts of expressing our faith should only be done if they help us to connect with God and are meaningful to us, no one should feel obligated to do anything out of a sense of ritual and tradition.

Prayer and worship over the centuries have often been aided by stimulating our different senses, such as the visual (using different colours for the different seasons in the Church year), the auditory (ringing of bells during the Eucharistic Prayer), the smell of incense etc. Some of these we still retain today... look out next month for an exploration of why we use the bells during the Eucharistic Prayer, especially as a question has just been submitted into the box about this! If you've never made the sign of the cross in worship, perhaps give it a go, and see how it feels – but only if you would like to try it and only as a way of praying and connecting with God... And if it doesn't appeal to you, don't worry – we all pray and worship in different ways!

BARTHOLOMEW – SAINT OF SUMMER (AND HIS LOVELY HYMN, WHICH NO-ONE SINGS)



This year St Batholomew's day, 24th August, fell on a Thursday, and I was able to speak about him at our 1030 service at St Margaret's.

And what do we know about Bartholomew? 'Norra lorra', as Cilla Black used to say. Beyond the fact that he was an apostle almost nothing is known for certain about his life.

It so happens that there is a lovely hymn written to commemorate Bartholomew, but trust his luck ... it is almost never sung, as it fits to no wellknown tune. Added to which, his day is in late August when people are away, and choirs are on holiday.

And yet, and yet... the hymn conveys a vital truth which applies to every one of us, and I am sure it justifies a bit of space in Crossroads. It was written by Jan Struther, better known for "Lord of all hopefulness". Can I invite you to read it, quite slowly, if you have a moment?

- 1 O Saint of summer, what can we sing for you? How can we praise you, what can we bring for you? Lost are your words, your deeds are nameless, Saint without history, mute and fameless.
- 2 Said you wise sayings? No one has hoarded them. Worked you great wonders? None has recorded them. Only your name, time's hand defying, Shines with the light of your faith undying.
- *3* So fade the words, so vanish the deeds from us Of each lost summer, swift as it speeds from us; We jest, we toil, we weep, but after Slip from our memories grief and laughter.

- 4 Only the sun that cheered us and shone for us, All else forgotten, ever lives on for us, Kindling our hearts when summer's ended – Soul of the summer, serene and splendid.
- 5 Time, take our words and do what thou wilt with them; Death, take our hands and all that we built with them; Only our faith, our soul's endeavour, Take it, Lord, make it, Lord, shine for ever.

Do you find those words strangely moving? They focus on the very fact that Bartholomew is a saint of whom we know so little, and who left seemingly no trace on the world. Jan Struther's words remind us that it will be just the same for us, too, after we ourselves die.

We read much the same in Psalm 103:

"The days of man are but as grass: For he flourisheth as a flower of the field. For as soon as the wind goeth over it, it is gone: And the place thereof shall know it no more."

So our words and deeds fade into obscurity, and this is a truth we must accept.

Struther adds a note of nostalgia, as she speaks of the passing summers, taking us so swiftly from the springtime of childhood to the autumn of life. "So fade the words, so vanish the deeds from us / of each lost summer, swift as it speeds from us." Nostalgia for time past, but also a reminder of God's gift of time and our duty to use it well. This is powerful stuff indeed.

The idea of our earthly life leaving no trace on the world could be a slightly depressing one, but the hymn stresses that we give our lives, our faith, "Our souls endeavour", and offer them to the Lord. This is the true worth of our life.

The more I read through these five verses, the more I admire both the originality of thought and the craftsmanship of the poetry. So why don't we sing it ?

Sadly this lovely hymn has a very unusual metre, so no well-known tune will work, and so almost no-one knows or sings it.

Just as there are saints about whom we know very little, so there are hymns which for one reason or another are unlikely to feature on the music list of an average parish church. That does not mean however that they are without value, because hymns can be read and thought about, just as they can be sung and thought about.

I could have ended there, but guess what? Out of the blue, not so many weeks ago, an old and dear friend sent me a tune that he has written for these words. It's grown on me, and I think perhaps you might take to it as well. Maybe we should give it a try. Remember, we mastered a new tune for Rachel's installation, so don't let's say it can't be done!

LOGO THOUGHTS






