

On Mothering Sunday, Rachel mentioned Mothering Buns whilst addressing her congregation, which set me wondering; what are Mothering Buns? But Google tells me...

MOTHERING BUNS

Have you ever wondered by Mother's Day falls on a different day each year? There's a very good reason for that and unbelievably Mother's Day never started out as a holiday to celebrate your mother at all.

The origins of Mothering Sunday reach back to the sixteenth century when people returned to their "mother" church for Laetare Sunday (the fourth Sunday of Lent). In the Industrial Age it became a day when servants were given a day off to return to their family and it was often the only time of the year when entire families would congregate together and visit church as a family. It was also known as "going a-Mothering." Over time this Mothering Sunday tradition evolved to one where mothers are celebrated.

Mothering buns were traditionally made by children for their mother, no doubt with a little supervision from their mother. A speciality of Bristol, the buns were made by local bakers the day before Mothering Sunday. Traditionally, on this day only, the Lent fast was relaxed. The buns used to be decorated with caraway or aniseed; today, hundreds and thousands are used.

MOTHERING BUNS' RECIPE MAKES 12

Sweet and sticky buns to make for Mother's Day... or just because



FOR THE BUNS

FOR THE ICING

500g strong white bread flour 1 tsp salt 50g caster sugar 7g sachet instant yeast 50g unsalted butter, diced and softened 300ml water

200g icing sugar 2-3 tbsp water

1. Put the flour in a large bowl. Add the salt and sugar on one side, the yeast on the other. Add the butter and three-quarters of the water, then turn the mixture round with the fingers of one hand. Add the remaining water a little at a time, mixing until you have taken in all the flour and the dough is soft and slightly sticky; you might not need all the water.

2. Oil the work surface to stop the dough sticking. Turn out the dough and knead for 5 mins, or until smooth and no longer sticky. Lightly oil the bowl, return the dough to it and cover with cling film. Leave to rise for at least an hour, until doubled in size. Line 2 baking trays

with baking parchment.

3. Scrape the dough out of the bowl onto a lightly floured surface and fold it inwards repeatedly until all the air has been knocked out and the dough is smooth. Divide into 12 pieces.

4. Roll each piece into a ball by placing it into a cage formed by your hand on the work surface and moving your hand in a circular motion, rotating the ball rapidly.

5. Put the balls of dough on the prepared baking trays, spacing them slightly apart. (They should just touch each other when they have risen.) Place each tray in a clean plastic bag and leave to prove for about 40 mins, until the rolls have doubled in size. Heat the oven to 220C/Fan 200/425F.

6. Bake for 10–12 mins, until the rolls are golden and sound hollow when tapped underneath. Transfer to a wire rack to cool.


7. For the icing, mix the icing sugar with enough water to give a thick but pourable consistency. Dip each roll into the icing and then into the hundreds and thousands.

Holy Week and Easter

On Monday in Holy Week (25th March), we have a candlelit service of Compline, or night prayer, at 7.00pm.

On Maundy Thursday (28th March) there is the normal 10.30am communion service, and at 7.30pm at St George's, communion followed by a quiet time of reflection.

On Holy Saturday at St Margaret's, we have our very special Service of Light starting at 8.00pm.

SUNLIGHT ON A LOCK

The other week in St Margaret's, the sun just happened to illuminate something I had never really noticed before. It was the lock of our main door and its fine metalwork. Out came the mobile phone to capture what I saw, for later study.

This lock undoubtedly dates from the restoration of the church in 1855. Churches all over the country were then being repaired, enlarged or built from scratch, and there was a thriving industry of art workers to provide all the hardware needed. Blacksmiths, tinsmiths, joiners, jewellers, embroiderers, stained glass workers, all producing a wealth of fittings and ornaments.

Firms such as Jones & Willis of Birmingham produced pattern books and could supply things in a range of qualities, from the richest and most detailed, down to the plain and utilitarian. I imagine much was left to the individual artist or craftsman ... provided the work stayed within budget, of course.

Just look at this lock. A sturdy oak box to hide the lock itself, and superb iron straps to secure it. Note the shapely curves and the pleasing arrangement of the screw heads. And above and below the box, the teardrop-shaped strap ends. The straps are decorated with deeply-cut lines around the screw heads, and there are wavy-diamond shapes halfway up, just to break up the plain surface.

When I was growing up one might have said "oh, it's only Victorian". Now, I ask myself: "who could do that work today, and at what cost?" Yes, there are skilled blacksmiths (a few), but have they the design skills to dish up work as good as this, and for a simple village church on a modest budget? I fear it's extremely doubtful.

I hope the black and white picture in the printed Crossroads will be clear enough, but I'll put a decent size colour photograph up on each of the church notice boards, so you can see what I am on about.

February 27 is the feast of Saint Baldomerus of Lyons, the patron saint of locksmiths. He was a simple man, very devout and frugal in his lifestyle, working with his hands as a locksmith. St Baldomerus was always aware of the needs of others, and he gave away most of what he had to those less fortunate than himself. The Abbot of the nearby monastery of Saint-Just was so impressed with St Baldomerus that he made available to him one of the monastic cells so that he could spend time there in prayer. He died about the year 660, having gained a reputation for himself of simple piety and goodness.

St Baldomerus sets a good example to follow. He was a simple tradesman who lived by working with his hands, not a priest or a religious. He did not seek fortune and fame but did good through his work, sharing his wages and possessions with the needy.

Editor's note: I just thought that you might like to know the above note about the patron Saint of locksmiths.

B IS FOR.....

Boomerangs? Biscuits? Banquets?

Ruth Valerio in her book 'L is for Lifestyle' chooses Bananas.

80 years ago, during the 2nd World War, my parents as children never saw a Banana. Nowadays, they are the world's most popular fruit and regularly on the shopping lists of 9 out of 10 UK households.

How has such a change come about? Chiefly through the rise of large Supermarket chains and Global Trade practises. Ruth could have chosen to call her chapter B is for Bullies because many powerful corporate firms in the Food Industry, Big Name multinationals, exercise their influence over prices in such a way that less than 10% of the price paid by the consumer goes back to the producers whilst almost 80% stays with them.

Many workers in countries which grow our food, including Bananas, not only live in poverty but all too frequently also suffer ill health from the high use of chemicals during the intensive farming and production processes.

There has in recent years been some hopeful changes with companies such as Fair Trade becoming more influential and more 'fairly traded' choices appearing on our supermarket shelves. I've spotted Tea, Coffee, Chocolate and Wine as well as Bananas.

Consumer power is real, the choices we make weekly as we shop can make a real difference.

If you want to exercise your Activism hat (see last month's article) there is an organisation called the Trade Justice Movement,

(www.tradejusticemovement.org.uk) which is a coalition of aid agencies, environment and human right campaigners, fair trade organisations, faith, and consumer groups. If you have questions but do not have internet access, I can do some research for you. Meanwhile may we all continue to pray about these issues as we journey towards a fairer, simpler, Kingdom centred world.

HOW DO FOOD BANKS WORK?

FOOD IS DONATED by Schools, churches, businesses, and individuals who donate non-perishable, in-date food to a food bank. Large collections often take place as part of seasonal celebrations such as Harvest and Christmas, and food is also collected at supermarkets.

FOOD IS SORTED & STORED by volunteers who sort food to check that it's in date and store it ready to be given to people who are referred to food banks in crisis. More than 40,000 people give up their time to volunteer at food banks across the UK.

PROFESSIONALS IDENTIFY PEOPLE IN NEED. Our Food banks partner with a wide range of care professionals such as doctors, teachers, health visitors and social workers to identify people in crisis and give them a food bank voucher to access emergency food.

PEOPLE REFERRED RECEIVE FOOD by bringing their voucher to a food bank centre where it can be redeemed for three days' emergency food. Volunteers welcome people and offer them further support to help resolve the crisis they face.

St George's has a weekly collection of the donations made; Foodbank personnel usually arrive on a Friday morning, but we accept your donations mainly on a Sunday, but it can be anytime during the week when St George's Centre is open. There are crates in the corridor, just pop your donations in one of the crates. There is a list of the most urgently needed items by Foodbank in our Signpost each week.

Your support, however small, is welcomed and although you may not be thanked personally, you can be assured that you and your donations are appreciated not only by us here in the Benefice but by those who receive the results of your thoughtfulness.

The Foodbank which collects from St George's on a Friday morning is George Whitfield Centre, 107 Great Western Road, Gloucester, GL1 3NF.

They really need: long life fruit juice (not chilled), tinned tomatoes, and tinned vegetables (peas, carrots, sweetcorn, potatoes), tinned or cartons of custard, and tinned rice pudding, tinned fruit, tinned meat (e.g. corned beef, ham), and Fray Bentos pies, packet Pasta 'N' Sauce, and Instant Mash, bottles of sauce, bottles of squash, toiletries inc. shampoo/shower gel, and toothpaste.

They currently have excess of: Tea, Dry Spaghetti, Baked Beans, Rice (Long Grain/basmati etc).

An EASTER thank you...

Thank you to everyone who was involved in any activity or service during the lead upto and over the Easter period at St Margaret's or at St George's, your involvement, time, and caring has not gone unnoticed.



During the week of 11th March, we were delighted to welcome into church 628 children and over 50 school staff and parents for Explore Easter, in 18 class groups, Mondays@6.15 group, and the Beavers and Cubs! This is the third time we have been able to offer this important mission activity at St George's, and it is a particular joy to do this with our friends across the Church in Tuffley.

We are very blessed to benefit from the immense gifts and experience of Pastor David from Grange Baptist, who was a Headteacher of a Church School for 13 years before accepting the call to be the Community Pastor at Grange. David tells the Easter story to each class group gathered on the platform at St George's, in such an engaging and interactive way, that the children are engrossed and hanging on his every word.

After they have heard the story, from Palm Sunday to Easter Day, they have half an hour to explore for themselves the meaning of God's love and forgiveness through 8 different activities set up around the church. Rachel normally leads the Last Supper activity, where the children get to re-enact the Last Supper with crackers and pretend wine! The children this year loved sitting underneath the Last Supper sculpture and nearly everyone one of them expressed amazement in a 'wow' when they looked up around the table, to Jesus sitting at the end (one of the children said Jesus looked like a lion!) At the other stations around the church, there is usually a volunteer to help the children to think about the activity and the meaning of that part of the story - there have been some wonderful, very touching conversations over the week. churches, and we could not do this without you. Thank you also to all who have prayed for the week, this too is very important.
